10. Description and Purpose of Organization (Limit length to visible area)

The Greater Baltimore Urban League (GBUL) was founded in December 1924 to assist migrants from the rural south to successfully adapt to urban life, address discrimination, and overcome civil and human rights challenges. The Baltimore Urban League led multiple efforts to open opportunities and integrate institutions, including the Baltimore City Fire Department, The University of Maryland, Baltimore Medical Society, and the Baltimore Emergency Relief Commission, among others.

11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit length to visible area)

We at the Greater Baltimore Urban League (GBUL) respectfully request \$25,000 to complete roof and gutter repairs as well as finishing our HVAC system restoration, in order to arrest damaging water penetration to the interior and exterior of the historic Orchard Street Church. Our restoration project is a long-term, phased plan that prioritizes visitor viability, structural integrity, and long-term support over aesthetic concerns. Arresting the water damage is vital to protecting our building. Damaged roof drains allow water to flow into the masonry, causing mortar joints to deteriorate, bricks to loosen, and window sills to crumble. Water passes through the brick and pools behind interior walls causing major damage.

28. Comments

The Orchard Street Church is the oldest structure built by African Americans in the City of Baltimore. The Church is a major destination for tourists interested in Baltimore's Black History. In addition to tours of the Church and its tunnels, living history presenters portraying Harriet Tubman and Frederick Douglass teach students the history of slavery and emancipation. The Orchard Street Church is a place that most completely represents the story of Black churches in the United States. Whether visitors come for field trips and reenactments, tours, or social services, they come to the Orchard Street Church to strengthen and uplift themselves.

In 1989, the Greater Baltimore Urban League (GBUL) bought the property of the Orchard Street Church due to request from the surrounding community and the site's importance in the Underground Railroad. Having been vacant for nearly two decades; time, weather, and vandalism had nearly destroyed the historic beauty of this important structure (when the GBUL purchased the building it was slated for demolition by the city). For the next two years, the Orchard Street Church would undergo massive restoration, returning the structure to its state in 1882, the time of its most recent expansion. The GBUL moved into the building in 1992, where it would become host to program space, offices, classrooms, an auditorium, and a piece of living history offering tours and visits. Today, this historic building is once again in dire need of renovation and maintenance work. Our phased project is designed to address three major needs facing the Orchard Street Church. The phases are as follows:

(1) Arrest water penetration in the roof, exterior and interior corners; and clean and repair the gutters. (2) Restore the HVAC system to 100% functionality. (3) Repair the interior stairwells and the sanctuary hall ceiling while making upgrades to the windows and electrical system.

We humbly ask the Maryland Senate and House of Delegates to assist us with the first two phases of our restoration. These repairs will not only contribute to the longevity of the structure, but to the GBUL as well; by allowing programs and administrative work to operate at higher capacity while allowing for an improved overall experience for visitors and tourists.

The Baltimore City community, and in particular the African American community, will benefit from these repairs, and accessibility to the Church will be greatly improved. A restored and consistently inhabitable building will enhance the quality of experience of our Black history tours, living history presentations, and active humanitarian programs (college readiness, job training, and technology classes) geared towards African American participants.

In 2011 our HVAC system was vandalized and stripped of mechanical components, copper and electrical parts by thieves, since then our building has become extremely vulnerable to temperatures during the summer and winter months. Our staff works in offices heated only by space heaters in winter and cooled only by fans during the summer. With fewer opportunities for visitors and program development, we and the community lose chances to share the Orchard Street Church's history and GBUL's humanitarian services. The fluctuating temperatures and high humidity also put our building, artifacts, historical documents and photographs at risk. As of today, \$17,500 of soft match work has been utilized to render the HVAC to a minimum functioning level.

The Orchard Street Church is open year round, Monday through Friday from 9AM until
