10. Description and Purpose of Organization (Limit length to visible area)

Founded in 1864, Good Shepherd Services provides residential treatment and therapeutic educational programming for at-risk, disadvantaged and underserved girls and boys ages 13 to 21 who are experiencing severe mental health and behavioral disorders. Good Shepherd's mission is Love in Action and rests on the belief that one person is more precious than a world. Our goal is to help each adolescent develop his or her full potential in work or school and transition successfully into their community.

11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit length to visible area)

We will renovate a portion of our school into a simulated life skills setting called Shepherd Town Center. Within a safe and assisted environment, our youth will experience authentic, work-based education and gain real-world life skills. Under the requirements of MSDE, one of the goals of this project is to develop our students' college and career readiness upon graduating from high school. We will create five different venues including a screen printing shop; a graphic design shop; a contractor shop; a hotel; and Shepherd Town Hall. Capital costs include construction to the ceilings, drywall, electrical, wiring, plumbing, smoke detectors, a sprinkler system, heating, ventilation, and flooring.

28. Comments

Good Shepherd School is a self-contained educational facility located within Good Shepherd Services. The school is approved by the Maryland State Department of Education as a Type I full day, partial day and residential Special Education and related services program for students with emotional disability in an Elementary School (Grade 8) and a Secondary School (Grades 9 through 12) and a GED tests preparation program. Our target population for this project is students who are earning high school diplomas, a GED or certificate of completion according to MSDE guidelines. This includes both our general education students and special education students.

According to a 2014 report released by the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI), the unemployment rate is 84% for individuals receiving public mental health services in Maryland. We want to see our students become self-sufficient and conduct healthy, productive lives so that they do not fall into unemployment or return to a residential treatment facility.

Our Shepherd Town Center is based off of other successful simulated towns for disabled persons. The Friendship Circle, a non-profit organization in Michigan, created a simulated learning environment similar to what we are proposing; they named their environment LifeTown and created a Lessons for Life curriculum for special needs students, focused on teaching core life skills that mirror goals on students Individual Education Plans (IEPs).

There are similar career pathways programs in Maryland, though each school's admissions process, location, and student population differs. For example, Maryland Project Search prepares students in their last year of high school for transition to an internship program but eliminates students with special needs through its rigorous application process and lack of hands-on vocational training. Our simulated learning environment hopes to bridge the gap by helping students with severe mental health and behavioral problems prepare for an attainable career. Our hospitality career pathway, for example, will focus on housekeeping, front desk operations, bell hop and dining service careers. Students will learn how to open doors, greet customers, carry luggage and escort guests. They will learn how to dust, vacuum, make beds and so on.

Good Shepherd Services has received four bond bills from the State of Maryland. In 2009, we received \$75,000 to renovate bathrooms in several residential units to update fixtures and install safety features. We received \$100,000 in 2011 to renovate our student courtyard so that our youth would have access to outdoor recreation space. In 2013, we received \$70,000 to replace our cooling tower which was original to the building and in danger of breaking down. Lastly, we received \$100,000 to renovate two male residential units to update the space with therapeutic design principles, and make it safe and livable. All four projects were completed successfully and within budget. The General Assembly's support has been a tremendous help as we continue to provide our students with the care and support that they need to return to their homes and communities.
