SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION

Power

2 United States Constitution – Amendments Convention – Limitations on Federal

FOR the purpose of applying to the U.S. Congress for an amendments convention called under Article V of the U.S. Constitution, on the application of the legislatures of two-thirds of the several states, to propose amendments to the U.S. Constitution that impose fiscal restraints on the federal government, limit the power and jurisdiction of the federal government, and limit the terms of office for officials of the federal government and for the members of the U.S. Congress; and generally relating to an application to Congress for a convention to propose amendments to the U.S.

WHEREAS, The Founders of our Constitution empowered state legislators to be guardians of liberty against future abuses of power by the federal government; and

WHEREAS, The federal government has created a crushing national debt through improper and imprudent spending; and

WHEREAS, The federal government has invaded the legitimate roles of the states through the manipulative process of federal mandates, many of which to a great extent are unfunded; and

WHEREAS, The federal government has ceased to live under a proper interpretation of the Constitution of the United States; and

WHEREAS, It is the solemn duty of the states to protect the liberty of our people – particularly for the generations to come – and to propose amendments to the Constitution of the United States through a Convention of the States under Article V of the U.S. Constitution that would place clear restraints on abuses of power by the U.S. Congress; now, therefore, be it



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RESOLVED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That, as provided in Article V of the U.S. Constitution, the General Assembly of Maryland respectfully applies to the U.S. Congress for an amendments convention to be called as soon as two—thirds of the several states have applied for a convention, for the purpose of proposing amendments to the U.S. Constitution that impose fiscal restraints on the federal government, limit the power and jurisdiction of the federal government, and limit the terms of office for officials of the federal government and for the members of the U.S. Congress; and be it further

8 RESOLVED, That delegates to the convention from Maryland may not propose 9 amendments that do not have the primary goals of addressing the goals listed in this Joint 10 Resolution; and be it further

RESOLVED, That this application constitutes a continuing application in accordance with Article V of the U.S. Constitution until at least two—thirds of the legislatures of the several states have made application for an equivalently limited amendments convention; and be it further
