House Bill 841 (Delegate Folden, et al.)

Health and Government Operations

General Provisions - Commemorative Days - International Gang Awareness Day

This bill requires the Governor to annually proclaim the third Monday in September as International Gang Awareness Day. The proclamation must urge communities and criminal justice professionals throughout the State and the United States to take a stand against gangs and the threat that gangs pose to public safety.

The bill takes effect July 1, 2017.

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: The bill is not anticipated to materially affect State operations or finances.

Local Effect: The bill is not anticipated to materially affect local government operations or finances.

Small Business Effect: None.

Analysis

Current Law/Background: Sixteen official commemorative days, six months, and one week are recognized in State law, as shown in **Exhibit 1**. The Governor also must issue a proclamation each year encouraging citizens and other individuals to observe a moment of silence at 3 p.m. on Memorial Day to unite in remembrance and commemorate the heroic acts and efforts of Marylanders who have served and died in the U.S. Armed Forces.

According to Maryland law, a "criminal gang" is defined as a group or association of three or more persons whose members (1) individually or collectively engage in a pattern of criminal gang activity; (2) have as one of their primary objectives or activities the commission of one or more underlying crimes, including acts by juveniles that would be underlying crimes if committed by adults; and (3) have in common an overt or covert organizational or command structure.

Researchers have found global evidence of international gangs; examples include (1) the Russian "mafiya" in Chicago; (2) Nigerian drug smugglers coming through Ronald Reagan International Airport; (3) links between U.S. tongs and Chinese Triads; and (4) MS-13 and 18th Street operating in the metro DC area. According to a 2009 report on combating gangs by the U.S. Government Accountability Office, gangs (including international gangs) are involved in various criminal activities, including the following: selling drugs; people smuggling; assault; drive-by shooting; homicide; identification theft; prostitution operations; robbery; and weapons trafficking.
