## Department of Transportation – Pedestrian and Bicycle Access to <del>Public</del> Schools <del>Study</del>

- 4 FOR the purpose of requiring the Department of Transportation to study and make certain 5 recommendations regarding collect and consolidate available information from State 6 and local agencies regarding an unmet need for safe pedestrian and bicycle access to 7 public schools in the State; requiring the Department to report its findings and 8 recommendations to the Governor and the General Assembly on or before a certain 9 date; providing for the termination of this Act; and generally relating to a study of 10 the collection and consolidation of information regarding pedestrian and bicycle access to public schools in the State. 11
- 12 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, 13 That:
- 14 (a) (1) The Department of Transportation shall study pedestrian and bicycle 15 access to public schools in the State.
- 16 (2) In conducting the study, the Department shall:
- 17 (i) examine collect and consolidate available information from State
  18 and local agencies regarding an unmet need for safe pedestrian and bicycle access to public
  19 schools throughout the State.

5 7	(b) On or before January 1, 2020, the Department shall report its findings and recommendations to the Governor and, in accordance with § 2–1246 of the State Government Article, the General Assembly.
3	SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect October 1, 2018. It shall remain effective for a period of 2 years and, at the end of September 30, 2020, this Act, with no further action required by the General Assembly, shall be abrogated and of no further force and effect.
