A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

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Surface Mining - Zone of Dewatering Influence - Water Supply Replacement

- FOR the purpose of requiring a certain surface mining permittee to permanently replace a certain water supply within a certain zone of dewatering influence within a certain period of time under certain circumstances; authorizing a certain surface mining permittee to seek reimbursement for certain water supply replacement costs under certain circumstances; providing for the construction of certain provisions of law relating to a contested case hearing; making a stylistic change; and generally relating to the zone of dewatering influence around a surface mine.

- 20 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND,
- 21 That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

- 24 (a) In this subtitle the following words have the meanings indicated.

2 1 "Land" means the surface of the land upon which surface mining is conducted. (f) 2 "Landowner" means a person who possesses legal title to the land. (g) 3 "Permittee" means a person who holds a valid permit to conduct surface (n) mining and reclamation operations approved by the Department under § 15–810 of this 4 subtitle. 5 6 "Pit" means the place any minerals are being mined by the surface mining (p) 7 method. "Surface mining" means all of the following: 8 (u) 9 (1) The breaking of the surface soil in order to facilitate or accomplish the extraction or removal of minerals: 10 11 Any activity or process constituting all or part of a process for the 12 extraction or removal of minerals from their original location; or 13 (3)The extraction of sand, gravel, rock, stone, earth, or fill from borrow pits for highway construction purposes or other public facilities. 14 15-812. 15 16 The General Assembly finds that in certain regions of the State dewatering of surface mines located in karst terrain may significantly interfere with water supply wells 17 18 and may cause in some instances sudden subsidence of land, known as sinkholes. 19 Dewatering in karst terrain may result in property damage to landowners in a definable 20 zone of dewatering influence around a surface mine. 21(b) It is the intent of the General Assembly to protect affected property owners in 22Baltimore, Carroll, Frederick, and Washington counties where karst terrain is found by 23directing the Department to establish zones of dewatering influence around surface mines 24in karst terrain and to administer a program requiring permittees to mitigate or 25compensate affected property owners in these counties. 26 15-813. 27 In this section the following words have the meanings indicated. (a) (1) 28 (2) "Dewater" or "dewatering" means to pump water out of a pit. 29 (3)"Karst terrain" means an irregular topography that is: 30 Caused by a solution of limestone and other carbonate rock; and (i)

Characterized by closed depressions, sinkholes, caverns, solution

cavities, and underground channels that, partially or completely, may capture surface streams.

- 3 (4) "Lineaments" means the surface manifestation of cracks, fissures, 4 fractures, and zones of weakness that, generally, are observable on aerial photographs as 5 straight or nearly straight lines.
- 6 (b) (1) If a permittee is issued a water appropriation permit under § 5–502 of 7 this article to dewater a pit located in karst terrain in Baltimore, Carroll, Frederick, and 8 Washington counties, the Department shall establish, as a condition of the permittee's 9 surface mining permit under § 15–810 of this subtitle, a zone of dewatering influence 10 around the surface mine.
- 11 (2) The areal extent of the zone of dewatering influence shall be based, as 12 appropriate, on local topography, watersheds, aquifer limits, and other hydrogeologic 13 factors, including the occurrence of natural fractures, cracks, crevices, lineaments, igneous 14 dikes, changes in rock type, and variations in the water-bearing characteristics of 15 formations.
- 16 (c) **(1)** Within the zone of dewatering influence established under subsection 17 (b)(1) of this section, the permittee shall:
- [(1)] (I) Replace, at no expense to the owner of real property that is affected by the surface mine dewatering, a water supply that fails as a result of declining ground water levels; and

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- [(2)] (II) [Upon] ON a determination by the Department of proximate cause after the permittee has received proper notice and an opportunity to respond and provide information, pay monetary compensation to the affected property owner or repair any property damage caused as a result of the sudden subsidence of the surface of the land.
- (2) A PERMITTEE SHALL PERMANENTLY REPLACE A WATER SUPPLY UNDER PARAGRAPH (1)(I) OF THIS SUBSECTION WITHIN 45 DAYS OF THE DATE ON WHICH THE PERMITTEE KNEW OF THE WATER SUPPLY FAILURE.
- (d) (1) An individual domestic water supply within a zone of dewatering influence that is no longer capable of yielding water because of declining water levels shall be considered to be replaced adequately by a permittee if the permittee provides for the affected property owner a new or retrofitted well that is capable of meeting the minimum yield requirements established in regulations adopted by the Department of the Environment during the period of pit dewatering.
- 34 (2) A municipal, industrial, commercial, institutional, or farming water 35 supply within a zone of dewatering influence that is no longer capable of yielding water 36 because of declining water levels shall be considered to be replaced adequately by a 37 permittee if the permittee provides for the affected property owner a new or retrofitted well

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or other alternative water supply that is capable of yielding water equal to the volume used or needed by the property owner before the disruption of water supply.

- 3 (e) (1) Real or personal property within the zone of dewatering influence in 4 karst terrain in Baltimore, Carroll, Frederick, and Washington counties found by the 5 Department to have been damaged as a result of sudden land surface subsidence shall be 6 considered to be repaired adequately by a permittee if the permittee returns the damaged 7 property to its condition before the subsidence of the surface of the land.
- 8 (2) If the damaged real or personal property is not capable of being restored 9 to its pre–subsidence condition, the permittee shall compensate the owner of the real or 10 personal property monetarily by the difference of the fair market value of the property as 11 the property would exist but for the sudden land subsidence, and the fair market value of 12 the property as a result of the damage.
- 13 (3) Notwithstanding the other provisions of this subsection, the permittee 14 and the property owner may agree on monetary compensation or other mitigation in lieu of 15 restoration.
- 16 (f) (1) The Department may not require a permittee to replace water supplies, 17 as provided in this section, if the permittee demonstrates to the Department by clear and 18 convincing evidence that the proximate cause of the loss of water supply is not the result of 19 pit dewatering.
- 20 (2) THE PERMITTEE MAY SEEK REIMBURSEMENT FOR THE COST OF A
 21 WATER SUPPLY REPLACEMENT FROM THE OWNER OF REAL PROPERTY THAT IS
 22 AFFECTED BY THE SURFACE MINE DEWATERING IF AFTER THE PERMITTEE
 23 REPLACES THE WATER SUPPLY IT IS DETERMINED THAT THE PERMITTEE'S
 24 DEWATERING ACTIVITY IS NOT THE PROXIMATE CAUSE OF THE WATER SUPPLY
 25 FAILURE.
- 26 (g) **(1)** The Department shall provide opportunity for a contested case hearing 27 in accordance with the provisions of § 5–204 of this article.
- 28 **(2)** This subsection may not be construed to waive the 29 REQUIREMENT TO PERMANENTLY REPLACE A WATER SUPPLY IN ACCORDANCE WITH 30 SUBSECTION (C)(2) OF THIS SECTION.
- 31 (h) The Department shall adopt regulations to establish an administrative 32 process to expedite the resolution of water supply loss or property damage claims arising 33 under this section.
- 34 (i) Compensation, restoration, or mitigation provided by this section does not 35 apply to:
 - (1) Improvements that are made to real property within an established

- zone of dewatering influence following a final decision by the Department to issue a surface mining permit; or
- 3 (2) Improvements that are made to real property following the establishment of a zone of dewatering influence as a condition of an existing surface mine permit.
- 6 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect 7 October 1, 2018.
