1 AN ACT concerning

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Solid Waste Management and Recycling - Mattresses and Box Springs

- 3 FOR the purpose of requiring a certain county plan to designate, on or before a certain date, 4 a certain agency to be responsible for creating a certain plan to address the disposal 5 of mattresses and box springs and the expansion and development of certain 6 businesses for certain purposes; requiring the Office of Recycling within the 7 Department of the Environment to encourage and facilitate certain programs that 8 divert mattresses and box springs from disposal in landfills and incinerators; 9 requiring the Office to collect and provide to local governments and the public certain 10 information on certain programs that facilitate the recycling and reuse of mattresses 11 and box springs; requiring the Office, in coordination with the Maryland 12 Environmental Service, to include in a certain report certain information relating to 13 the disposal and recycling of mattresses and box springs; requiring a county to 14 address, in a certain recycling plan by a certain date, a certain strategy for managing 15 the disposal of mattresses and box springs; requiring the Department of the 16 Environment to report to the General Assembly on or before a certain date; requiring the Department of Commerce to report to the General Assembly on or before a 17 18 certain date; and generally relating to solid waste management and recycling.

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2 1 (2014 Replacement Volume and 2017 Supplement) 2 Preamble 3 WHEREAS, In the United States, it is estimated that approximately 20 million 4 mattress units are disposed of annually; and 5 WHEREAS, Mattresses and box springs use up limited landfill space, damage 6 equipment used at landfills, contribute to air pollution when incinerated, and contribute to 7 roadside litter when dumped illegally; and 8 WHEREAS, Mattresses and box springs pose practical challenges inherent to 9 end-of-life management because they are bulky and not easily compacted, making transport and disposal inefficient; and 10 WHEREAS, Programs to address the end-of-life management of mattresses and box 11 12 springs have been implemented successfully in other jurisdictions, including extended 13 producer responsibility programs and programs implemented through nonprofit 14 organizations with expertise in social enterprises; and WHEREAS, A mattress recycling program under St. Vincent de Paul Society of Lane 15 16 County, Oregon, operates 3 recycling facilities, employs more than 500 individuals, including disadvantaged individuals, and diverts 17.8 million pounds of reusable and 17 18 recyclable material from landfills annually; and 19 WHEREAS, Under Executive Order 01.01.2017.13, Maryland has committed to 20 sustainable materials management practices, which use and manage materials as 21efficiently and sustainably as possible throughout their entire life cycles; and 22WHEREAS, According to Executive Order 01.01.2017.13, through source reduction, 23reuse, and recycling, Maryland can extend existing disposal capacity, reduce the need to 24construct new or expanded solid waste disposal facilities, conserve natural resources, and 25support a productive economy through recovery of valuable resources; and 26 WHEREAS, According to Executive Order 01.01.2017.13, studies have shown that 27 diverting material from disposal to reuse, recycling, and composting results in more jobs 28 and a more sustainable economy; and 29 WHEREAS, Executive Order 01.01.2017.13 establishes as the policy of the State that 30 solid waste and recycling should seek to, among other things, minimize the environmental 31 impacts of materials management over their entire life cycles, including the end-of-life 32management of materials; and

WHEREAS, Implementing end-of-life management policies for mattresses and box springs is consistent with existing State policy; and

WHEREAS, Opportunities exist for Maryland and its local jurisdictions to engage in

1 public-private enterprises and other partnerships and collaborative efforts to address the 2disposal, collection, deconstructing, reuse, and recycling of mattresses and box springs; 3 now, therefore, SECTION 1. The recycling reductions of 35% and 20% provided in subsection (a)(18) and

- 1 (19) of this section are not intended to be the maximum percentage that a county can 2 achieve. A county that can practically and economically achieve a higher rate of recycling 3 is encouraged to submit a recycling plan for a higher percentage.
- 4 (d) If a county with a population less than 150,000 increases to a population of above 150,000, the county shall have 2 years to revise the recycling plan to be consistent with the recycling goals under subsection (a)(18) of this section.
- 7 (e) (1) The governing bodies of 2 or more counties may adopt a regional 8 recycling plan to comply with subsection (a)(18) or (19) of this section.
- 9 (2) A regional recycling plan which otherwise satisfies the requirements of 10 this subtitle for each of the participating counties shall constitute the county recycling plan 11 for each county which participates in the plan.

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
