2 Local Jurisdictions – Historic Preservation Standards – Prevention of Lethal 3 and Life-Threatening Nontidal Flooding 4 Historic Ellicott City Workgroup on Preservation and Flooding

FOR the purpose of authorizing the legislative body of a local jurisdiction in which a certain $\mathbf{5}$ 6 district is designated to authorize, by local law, a deviation from historic preservation 7 standards in order to prevent and reduce the risk of lethal and life-threatening 8 nontidal flooding under certain circumstances: defining certain terms: and generally 9 relating to the historic preservation standards and the prevention of lethal and 10 life_threatening nontidal flooding establishing the Historic Ellicott City Workgroup on Preservation and Flooding; providing for the composition, chair, and staffing of 11 the Workgroup; prohibiting a member of the Workgroup from receiving certain 12compensation, but authorizing the reimbursement of certain expenses; requiring the 13 Workgroup to study certain matters and design a certain process; requiring the 14 15Workgroup to report its findings and a certain process to certain entities and the members of the Howard County Delegation to the General Assembly on or before a 16certain date; providing for the termination of this Act; and generally relating to the 17Historic Ellicott City Workgroup on Preservation and Flooding. 18
