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1 AN ACT concerning

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Task Force on Higher Education - Students With a Chronic Health Condition Conditions - Reporting Requirements

FOR the purpose of requiring each institution of higher education that operates in the State to submit a certain report to the Maryland Higher Education Commission, the Governor, and the General Assembly on or before a certain date each year; requiring that the Commission make certain reports public; requiring a certain report to use information from certain sources and that is collected in a certain way; requiring a certain report to include certain information; defining a certain term; providing for the termination of this Act; and generally relating to a report on students with a chronic health condition at institutions of higher education establishing the Task Force on Higher Education Students With Chronic Health Conditions; providing for the composition, chair, and staffing of the Task Force; prohibiting a member from receiving certain compensation, but authorizing the reimbursement of certain expenses; requiring the Task Force to obtain data on, study, and make recommendations regarding certain matters; authorizing the Task Force to use certain resources to carry out its duties; requiring the Task Force to report its findings and recommendations to the Governor and the General Assembly on or before a certain date; requiring the Maryland Department of Health and the Maryland Higher Education Commission to make the report to the Governor and the General Assembly available to the public; providing for the termination of this Act; and generally relating to the Task Force on Higher Education Students With Chronic Health Conditions.
