CHAPTER	
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1 AN ACT concerning

Juvenile Justice Coordinating Council

- 3 FOR the purpose of establishing the Juvenile Justice Coordinating Council; providing for 4 the composition, chair, and staffing of the Council; prohibiting a member of the 5 Council from receiving certain compensation, but authorizing the reimbursement of 6 certain expenses; specifying the duties of the Council; authorizing the Council to 7 request certain technical assistance; requiring the Council to report its findings and 8 recommendations to the Governor and the General Assembly on or before a certain 9 date; providing for the termination of this Act; and generally relating to the Juvenile Justice Coordinating Council. 10
- 11 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND,
- 12 That:

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- 13 (a) There is a Juvenile Justice Coordinating Council in the Governor's Office of Crime Control and Prevention.
- 15 (b) The Council consists of the following members:
- 16 (1) three members of the Senate of Maryland, appointed by the President 17 of the Senate;
- 18 (2) three members of the House of Delegates, appointed by the Speaker of
- 19 the House;

22 23 24	(f) (g) In conducting the study and making recommendations as required under subsection (e) (f) of this section, the Council may request technical assistance from the Abell Foundation and the Council of State Governments.
25 26 27	(g) (h) On or before December 31, 2019, the Council shall report its findings and recommendations to the Governor and, in accordance with § 2–1246 of the State Government Article, the General Assembly.
28 29 30 31	SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect July 1, 2018. It shall remain effective for a period of $\frac{2}{3}$ years and, at the end of June 30, $\frac{2020}{2021}$, this Act, with no further action required by the General Assembly, shall be abrogated and of no further force and effect.
