## CHAPTER \_\_\_\_\_

1 AN ACT concerning

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### Baltimore County Anti-Bullying Task Force

3 FOR the purpose of establishing the Baltimore County Anti–Bullying Task Force; providing 4 for the composition, chairs, and staffing of the Task Force; prohibiting a member of  $\mathbf{5}$ the Task Force from receiving certain compensation, but authorizing the 6 reimbursement of certain expenses; requiring the Task Force to compile data, study, 7 and make recommendations regarding certain matters; requiring the Task Force to 8 submit preliminary and final reports of its findings and recommendations to the 9 Governor, the members of the Baltimore County delegation to the General Assembly, 10 and certain other entities on or before certain dates; providing for the termination of 11 this Act; and generally relating to the Baltimore County Anti–Bullying Task Force.

12 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, 13 That:

- 14 (a) There is a Baltimore County Anti–Bullying Task Force.
- 15 (b) The Task Force consists of the following members:

3 (2) On or before December 1, 2020, the Task Force shall submit a final 4 report of its findings and recommendations on the matters listed in subsection (f)(2) 5 through (5) of this section to the Governor and, in accordance with § 2–1246 of the State 6 Government Article, the members of the Baltimore County delegation to the General 7 Assembly.

- 8 (3) The Task Force additionally shall submit the reports required under 9 paragraphs (1) and (2) of this subsection to the following local entities:
- 10 (i) the Baltimore County Executive;
- 11 (ii) the Baltimore County Council;
- 12 (iii) the Baltimore County Superintendent of Schools;
- 13 (iv) the Baltimore County Board of Education;
- 14 (v) the Teachers Association of Baltimore County; and
- 15 (vi) the PTA Council of Baltimore County.

16 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect July 17 1, 2018. It shall remain effective for a period of 2 years and 6 months and, at the end of 18 December 31, 2020, this Act, with no further action required by the General Assembly, shall 19 he aburented and of an fourth on force and effect
