
- 4 FOR the purpose of authorizing a paramedic, subject to certain rules, regulations, protocols, 5 orders, and standards, to dispense naloxone in a nonemergency environment in 6 accordance with the Overdose Response Program; providing that a paramedic who 7 dispenses naloxone in accordance with the Program is not subject to certain 8 disciplinary actions; authorizing a paramedic to dispense naloxone to certain 9 individuals; providing that a certain cause of action may not arise against a paramedic under certain circumstances; providing that the Maryland Pharmacy Act 10 11 does not prohibit certain paramedics from dispensing naloxone in accordance with 12 the Program; defining a certain term; and generally relating to paramedics 13 dispensing naloxone in accordance with the Overdose Response Program.

20	(a) (1) In this section the following words have the meanings indicated.			
21	(12) "Paramedic" means an individual who has:			
22	(i) Completed a paramedic course approved by the EMS Board;			
23 24	(ii) Been examined and registered by the National Registry of Emergency Medical Technicians, Inc. as a paramedic;			
25 26	(iii) Demonstrated competence in medical protocols within this State as determined by the EMS Board; and			
27	(iv) Been licensed as a paramedic by the EMS Board.			
28 29 30 31	(G-1) (1) Subject to the rules, regulations, protocols, orders, and standards of the EMS Board, a paramedic may dispense naloxone in a nonemergency environment in accordance with the Overdose Response Program established under Title 13, Subtitle 31 of the Health – General Article.			



[(b)] (C) "Pharmacist" has the meaning stated in § 12–101 of the Health 32 Occupations Article.

- [(c)] (D) "Private or public entity" means a health care provider, local health department, community—based organization, substance abuse treatment organization, or other person that addresses medical or social issues related to drug addiction.
- 4 [(d)] (E) "Program" means the Overdose Response Program.
- 5 **[(e)] (F)** "Standing order" means a written instruction for the prescribing and 6 dispensing of naloxone in accordance with § 13–3106 of this subtitle.

- The Overdose Response Program is a program administered by the Department for the purpose of providing a means of authorizing certain individuals to administer naloxone to an individual experiencing, or believed to be experiencing, opioid overdose to help prevent a fatality when medical services are not immediately available.

- 13 (a) **(1)** A licensed health care provider with prescribing authority may 14 prescribe and dispense naloxone to an individual who:
- 15 **[**(1)**]** (I) Is believed by the licensed health care provider to be at risk of experiencing an opioid overdose; or
- 17 **[(2)] (II)** Is in a position to assist an individual at risk of experiencing an 18 opioid overdose.
- 19 (2) A PARAMEDIC MAY DISPENSE NALOXONE TO AN INDIVIDUAL WHO:
- 20 (I) IS BELIEVED BY THE PARAMEDIC TO BE AT RISK OF 21 EXPERIENCING AN OPIOID OVERDOSE; OR
- 22 (II) IS IN A POSITION TO ASSIST AN INDIVIDUAL AT RISK OF 23 EXPERIENCING AN OPIOID OVERDOSE.

- (b) (1) A cause of action may not arise against any licensed health care provider with prescribing authority or pharmacist for any act or omission when the health care provider with prescribing authority or pharmacist in good faith prescribes or dispenses naloxone and the necessary paraphernalia for the administration of naloxone to an individual under § 13–3106 of this subtitle.
- 30 (2) A CAUSE OF ACTION MAY NOT ARISE AGAINST A PARAMEDIC FOR 31 ANY ACT OR OMISSION WHEN THE PARAMEDIC IN GOOD FAITH DISPENSES

- 5 (K) THIS TITLE DOES NOT PROHIBIT A PARAMEDIC LICENSED UNDER § 6 13–516 OF THE EDUCATION ARTICLE FROM DISPENSING NALOXONE IN 7 ACCORDANCE WITH THE OVERDOSE RESPONSE PROGRAM ESTABLISHED UNDER 8 TITLE 13, SUBTITLE 31 OF THE HEALTH GENERAL ARTICLE.
- 9 [(k)] (L) This title does not limit the right of a general merchant to sell:
- 10 (1) Any nonprescription drug or device;
- 11 (2) Any commonly used household or domestic remedy; or
- 12 (3) Any farm remedy or ingredient for a spraying solution, in bulk or 13 otherwise.
- [(l)] (M) The Board of Pharmacy, the Board of Dental Examiners, the Board of Physicians, and the Board of Podiatric Medical Examiners annually shall report to the Office of Controlled Substances Administration:
- 17 (1) The names and addresses of its licensees who are authorized to 18 personally prepare and dispense prescription drugs; and
- 19 (2) The names and addresses of its licensees who have reported, in 20 accordance with subsection (c)(2)(ii)4L of this section, that they have personally prepared 21 and dispensed prescription drugs within the previous year.
- [(m)] (N) A dentist, physician, or podiatrist who fails to comply with the provisions of this section governing the dispensing of prescription drugs or devices shall:
- 24 (1) Have the dispensing permit revoked; and
- 25 (2) Be subject to disciplinary actions by the appropriate licensing board.
- SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect October 1, 2018.
