Real Property Tax - Exemption Applications - Approval Authority

This departmental bill repeals a requirement that a local Supervisor of Assessments must send a copy of each application for an exemption to the State Department of Assessments and Taxation (SDAT) headquarters in Baltimore for approval or rejection. Instead, the bill requires that the supervisor at the local office approve or reject each application for exemption. **The bill takes effect June 1, 2018.**

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: None. The bill codifies existing practice.

Local Effect: None.

Small Business Effect: The State Department of Assessments and Taxation has determined that this bill has minimal or no impact on small business (attached). The Department of Legislative Services concurs with this assessment.

Analysis

Current Law: A local Supervisor of Assessments must send a copy of each application for an exemption to the SDAT headquarters in Baltimore for approval or rejection.

Background: SDAT advises that in an effort to improve efficiency and customer service, exemption applications are now processed at each local assessment office, thus eliminating the need to send a copy of each exemption application to the SDAT headquarters in Baltimore. As a result, the bill codifies the current practice of the department.
