10. Description and Purpose of Organization (Limit length to visible area)

Parks & People was created in 1984 to facilitate public private partnerships to address the needs of our city's aging recreation and parks infrastructure and underfunded program capacity. From 2011 to the present Parks & People has completed over 100 greening projects throughout Baltimore. The projects Parks & People has created vary from simple practices such as urban impervious surface reduction and rain gardens, to large, public park projects such as the Ambrose Kennedy Park, Easterwood Sandtown Park, and the Harlem Park Inner Block Parks. Parks and other green spaces are consistently shown to improve resident's daily quality of life, foster young people's sense of ownership in their community, and serve as catalysts for economic investment. Thirty-four years after our founding, parks & green space remain a tried-and-true method for strengthening communities.

11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit length to visible area)

The Gateway Park project in Darley Park is the culmination of a collaborative effort on behalf of several organizations to revitalize a vacant site, located in a highly visible thoroughfare that has been a focus of activity in recent years. Parks & People will use Bond Bill funds to create a neighborhood park serving over 11,000 people living in households with more than 45% of children living below the poverty line. The design is based upon neighborhood input gathered over multiple charrettes. The best-in-class neighborhood park builds upon amenities while adding features like enhanced green space, walking trails, an arbor of trees, soil remediation and newly planted grass, play surfacing and play equipment, seating, lighting, and multiple beautiful stormwater management features. Through the hard work of many partners, it is on the verge of being a transformational asset for the neighborhood.

28. Comments

This highly visible site is located adjacent to Harford Road, a main thoroughfare of east Baltimore. Momentum and hard work from the community and partners has led to a series of temporary improvements including a place for barbeques, recreation for neighborhood children, community gatherings around spoken word, volunteer events; and a movie night with the Eastern District Police. The 6th Branch, a veterans organization, has built interim play equipment until a park can be completed and the Neighborhood Design Center recently received grant money to build a stage and mural, but full-scale improvements are needed to create a comprehensive, state-of-the-art park fully utilized by the community.

Gateway Park will serve over 11,000 people with the majority of households designated as extremely low income. Young children will come home from school and play at the park. Neighbors will have gatherings and host events. Elderly citizens often struggling with isolation will relax on benches shaded by trees and socialize. Where there is now dead grass, there will be a beautiful gathering area featuring native plants. The following is the planned scope of services:

- 1. Landscape the half acre plot of land with native plants;
- 2 .Create four stormwater management features around the perimeter of the large lot that will capture and prevent pollution from entering the harbor and Chesapeake Bay downstream;
- 3. Move the existing sign, an achievement and great source of pride for neighborhood residents, on the large lot to a more appealing location;
- 4. Install interpretive signage about the site as well as the environmental benefit;
- 5. Install a public art piece from a local artist (artist TBD);
- 6. Install a multi-purpose non-permanent structure for community events;
- 7. Install additional lighting around the site, both decorative and for safety
- 8. Furnish and install benches, picnic tables, and bollards around the perimeter to prevent vehicles driving through the park;
- 9. Install play area surfacing that is safe for children and environmentally friendly on the smaller lot;
- 10. Install play equipment provided by an in-kind provider on the smaller lot; and
- 11. Install play area seat wall so parents can supervise play.
