A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

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House:

State Procurement – Maryland Food for Maryland Institutions Task Force

- FOR the purpose of establishing the Maryland Food for Maryland Institutions Task Force; providing for the composition, chair, and staffing of the Task Force; prohibiting a member of the Task Force from receiving certain compensation, but authorizing the reimbursement of certain expenses; requiring the Task Force to study and make recommendations regarding certain matters; requiring the Task Force to report its findings and recommendations to the Governor and certain committees of the General Assembly on or before a certain date; defining a certain term; providing for the termination of this Act; and generally relating to the Maryland Food for Maryland Institutions Task Force.
- 12 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, 13 That:
- 14 (a) In this section, "locally grown food" means food grown in the State.
- 15 (b) There is a Maryland Food for Maryland Institutions Task Force.
- 16 (c) The Task Force consists of the following members:
- 17 (1) one member of the Senate of Maryland, appointed by the President of 18 the Senate;
- 19 (2) one member of the House of Delegates, appointed by the Speaker of the

15	(e) The Department of General Services shall provide staff for the Task Force.
16	(f) A member of the Task Force:
17	(1) may not receive compensation as a member of the Task Force; but
18 19	(2) is entitled to reimbursement for expenses under the Standard State Travel Regulations, as provided in the State budget.
20	(g) The Task Force shall:
21 22	(1) study Maryland's procurement statutes and regulations to identify changes necessary to increase the procurement of locally grown food under State contracts;
23 24	(2) identify opportunities for local governments to participate in State contracts for food;
25 26	(3) explore the role of unbundling State contracts to create greater opportunities for Maryland farmers to bid;
27 28	(4) review procurement processes used by public and private institutions in the State that have successfully increased their procurement of locally grown food;
29	(5) identify and make recommendations regarding achievable benchmarks

for increasing the percentage of State food-budget dollars spent on locally grown food by

2021, 2023, 2025, and 2027, with subtargets within different agricultural sectors;

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- 1 (6) identify federal and private funding sources for developing the 2 infrastructure necessary to achieve benchmarks for increasing the percentage of State 3 food-budget dollars spent on locally grown food;
- 4 (7) assess current and potential Maryland agricultural production, in 5 terms of crop opportunities and volume;
- 6 (8) assess the value and logistics of including reciprocal preferences for farms located in the region, but outside Maryland, in benchmarks for purchasing locally grown food; and
- 9 (9) make recommendations regarding:
- 10 (i) the development of a system for tracking and reporting the 11 percentage of State food-budget dollars spent on locally grown food to ensure that 12 benchmarks are being met;
- 13 (ii) technical assistance that may be needed from the Department of 14 Agriculture, the University of Maryland Extension, or other institutions in order to support 15 local farmers in meeting food safety and other requirements to engage in State institutional 16 procurement opportunities;
- 17 (iii) technical assistance that may be needed by procurement officers 18 and other purchasers in order to meet benchmarks for purchasing locally grown food;
- 19 (iv) possible changes to the 5% price preference for locally grown food 20 established under § 14–407 of the State Finance and Procurement Article;
- 21 (v) the structure of contracts for the protection of farmers and State 22 institutions in the case of crop failure or unexpected surplus;
- (vi) creating opportunities for small and medium—size farms as well as large farms seeking to diversify their current crops in order to compete for State contracts;
- 26 (vii) creating opportunities in State procurement processes for new 27 farmers, women farmers, minority farmers, and veteran farmers;
- 28 (viii) supporting farmers involved in State procurement to engage in 29 the Maryland Healthy Soils Program and other environmental programs;
- 30 (ix) other opportunities within State purchasing to increase the 31 market for Maryland farmers, including special events and office purchases; and
- 32 (x) opportunities for increasing transparency in the supply chain 33 from farm to institution.

(h) On or before January 1, 2020, the Task Force shall report its findings and
recommendations to the Governor and, in accordance with § 2-1246 of the State
Government Article, the Senate Education, Health, and Environmental Affairs Committee
and the House Health and Government Operations Committee.

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SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect June 1, 2019. It shall remain effective for a period of 1 year and, at the end of May 31, 2020, this Act, with no further action required by the General Assembly, shall be abrogated and of no further force and effect.
