A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

2 **Criminal Law – Human Trafficking and Prostitution Offenses**

3 FOR the purpose of altering the elements of the prohibitions against human trafficking and
4 renaming them sex trafficking; prohibiting a person from violating certain provisions
5 of this Act with the use of or intent to use force, threat, coercion, or fraud; prohibiting
6 a person from knowingly receiving a certain benefit in relation to a violation of
7 certain provisions of this Act; prohibiting a person from knowingly engaging in
8 certain conduct with the intent to compel another to marry any person under certain
9 circumstances; prohibiting a person from destroying, concealing, removing,
10 confiscating, or possessing certain documents while violating certain provisions of
11 this Act; prohibiting a person from aiding, abetting, or conspiring with another to
12 violate certain provisions of this Act; establishing that the lack of knowledge about
13 a victim's age is not a defense to certain offenses involving a child; establishing
14 certain penalties for violations of this Act; reorganizing certain provisions of law
15 relating to prostitution; defining certain terms; altering certain definitions; making
16 conforming changes; and generally relating to human trafficking and prostitution
17 offenses.

10 citation to a lodging establishment requiring it to post prominently in each guest room for

24 (B) **“ASSIGNATION” HAS THE MEANING STATED IN § 11–301 OF THIS**
25 **ARTICLE.**

26 (C) **“PROSTITUTION” HAS THE MEANING STATED IN § 11–301 OF THIS**
27 **ARTICLE.**

28 (D) **“SEXUALLY EXPLICIT PERFORMANCE” HAS THE MEANING STATED IN §**
29 **11–301 OF THIS ARTICLE.**

1 (a) (1) A person may not knowingly:

2 (i) take or cause another to be taken to any place for prostitution;

3 (ii) place, cause to be placed, or harbor another in any place for
4 prostitution;

5 (iii) persuade, induce, entice, or encourage another to be taken to or
6 placed in any place for prostitution;

7 (iv) receive consideration to procure for or place in a house of
8 prostitution or elsewhere another with the intent of causing the other to engage in
9 prostitution or assignation;

10 (v) engage in a device, scheme, or continuing course of conduct
11 intended to cause another to believe that if the other did not take part in a sexually explicit
12 performance, the other or a third person would suffer physical restraint or serious physical
13 harm; or

14 (vi) destroy, conceal, remove, confiscate, or possess an actual or
15 purported passport, immigration document, or government identification document of
16 another while otherwise violating or attempting to violate this subsection.

17 (2) A parent, guardian, or person who has permanent or temporary care or
18 custody or responsibility for supervision of another may not consent to the taking or
19 detention of the other for prostitution.

20 (b) (1) A person may not violate subsection (a) of this section involving a victim
21 who is a minor.

22 (2) A person may not [knowingly take or detain another] **VIOLATE**
23 **SUBSECTION (A) OF THIS SECTION** with the **USE OF OR** intent to use force, threat,
24 coercion, or fraud [to compel the other to marry the person or a third person or perform a
25 sexual act, sexual contact, or vaginal intercourse].

26 (c) (1) (i) Except as provided in paragraph (2) of this subsection, a person
27 who violates subsection (a) of this section is guilty of the misdemeanor of [human
28 trafficking] **SEX TRAFFICKING** and on conviction is subject to imprisonment not exceeding
29 10 years or a fine not exceeding \$5,000 or both.

30 (ii) A person who violates subsection (a) of this section is subject to §
31 5–106(b) of the Courts Article.

32 (2) A person who violates subsection (b) of this section is guilty of the felony
33 of [human trafficking] **SEX TRAFFICKING** and on conviction is subject to imprisonment not
34 exceeding 25 years or a fine not exceeding \$15,000 or both.

1 (d) A person who violates this section may be charged, tried, and sentenced in any
2 county in or through which the person transported or attempted to transport the other.

3 (e) (1) A person who knowingly benefits financially [or] by receiving anything
4 of value from participation in a venture that includes an act described in subsection (a) or
5 (b) of this section is subject to the same penalties that would apply if the person had violated
6 that subsection.

7 (2) A person who knowingly aids, abets, or conspires with one or more other
8 persons to violate any subsection of this section is subject to the same penalties that apply
9 for a violation of that subsection.

10 (f) It is not a defense to a prosecution under subsection (b)(1) **OR (E)** of this
11 section that the person did not know the age of the victim.

13 **(A) A PERSON MAY NOT KNOWINGLY:**

14 **(1) TAKE OR DETAIN ANOTHER WITH THE INTENT TO USE FORCE,**
15 **THREAT, COERCION, OR FRAUD TO COMPEL THE OTHER TO MARRY ANY PERSON;**

16 **(2) RECEIVE A FINANCIAL BENEFIT OR THING OF VALUE IN RELATION**
17 **TO A VIOLATION OF THIS SUBSECTION; OR**

18 **(3) AID, ABET, OR CONSPIRE WITH ANOTHER TO VIOLATE THIS**
19 **SUBSECTION.**

20 **(B) A PERSON WHO VIOLATES THIS SECTION IS GUILTY OF THE FELONY OF**
21 **FORCED MARRIAGE AND ON CONVICTION IS SUBJECT TO IMPRISONMENT NOT**
22 **EXCEEDING 25 YEARS OR A FINE NOT EXCEEDING \$15,000 OR BOTH.**

23 **(C) A PERSON WHO VIOLATES THIS SECTION MAY BE CHARGED, TRIED, AND**
24 **SENTENCED IN ANY COUNTY IN OR THROUGH WHICH THE PERSON TRANSPORTED OR**
25 **ATTEMPTED TO TRANSPORT THE VICTIM.**

27 (g) "Underlying crime" means:

28 (2) a violation of § 3-203 (second degree assault), **§ 3-1102 (SEX**
29 **TRAFFICKING), § 3-1103 (FORCED MARRIAGE),** § 4-203 (wearing, carrying, or
30 transporting a handgun), § 9-302 (inducing false testimony or avoidance of subpoena), §

4 (a) In this subtitle the following words have the meanings indicated.

5 (b) “Assignment” means the making of an appointment or engagement for
6 prostitution or any act in furtherance of the appointment or engagement.

7 (c) “Prostitution” means the performance of a sexual act, sexual contact, or
8 vaginal intercourse for hire.

9 (d) “Sexual act” has the meaning stated in § 3–301 of this article.

10 (e) “Sexual contact” has the meaning stated in § 3–301 of this article.

11 (f) “Sexually explicit performance” means a public or private, live, photographed,
12 recorded, or videotaped act or show in which the performer is wholly or partially nude, and
13 which is intended to sexually arouse or appeal to the prurient interest of patrons or viewers.

14 (g) “Solicit” means urging, advising, inducing, encouraging, requesting, or
15 commanding another.

16 (h) “Vaginal intercourse” has the meaning stated in § 3–301 of this article.

18 (a) A person may not knowingly:

19 (1) engage in prostitution or assignment by any means; **OR**

20 (2) [keep, set up,] occupy[, maintain, or operate] a building, structure, or
21 conveyance for prostitution or assignment[;

22 (3) allow a building, structure, or conveyance owned or under the person’s
23 control to be used for prostitution or assignment;

24 (4) allow or agree to allow a person into a building, structure, or conveyance
25 for prostitution or assignment; or

26 (5) procure or solicit or offer to procure or solicit for prostitution or
27 assignment].

28 (b) A person who violates this section is guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction
29 is subject to imprisonment not exceeding 1 year or a fine not exceeding \$500 or both.

1 (c) (1) Subject to paragraph (2) of this subsection, in a prosecution under this
2 section, it is an affirmative defense of duress if the defendant committed the act as a result
3 of being a victim of an act of another [who was charged with violating the prohibition
4 against human trafficking under § 11–303 of this subtitle or] **IN VIOLATION OF TITLE 3,
5 SUBTITLE 11 OF THIS ARTICLE OR THE PROHIBITION AGAINST HUMAN TRAFFICKING**
6 under federal law.

7 (2) A defendant may not assert the affirmative defense provided in
8 paragraph (1) of this subsection unless the defendant notifies the State’s Attorney of the
9 defendant’s intention to assert the defense at least 10 days prior to trial.

10 11–305.

11 (a) For the purpose of committing a crime under Title 3, Subtitle 3 of this article,
12 a person may not:

13 (1) persuade or entice or aid in the persuasion or enticement of an
14 individual under the age of 16 years from the individual’s home or from the custody of the
15 individual’s parent or guardian; and

16 (2) knowingly secrete or harbor or aid in the secreting or harboring of the
17 individual who has been persuaded or enticed in the manner described in item (1) of this
18 subsection.

19 (b) A person who violates this section is guilty of a felony and on conviction is
20 subject to imprisonment not exceeding 25 years or a fine not exceeding \$5,000 or both.

21 **(C) IT IS NOT A DEFENSE TO PROSECUTION UNDER THIS SECTION THAT THE
22 PERSON DID NOT KNOW THE AGE OF THE VICTIM.**

24 **(A) A PERSON MAY NOT KNOWINGLY PROCURE OR SOLICIT OR OFFER TO
25 PROCURE OR SOLICIT PROSTITUTION OR ASSIGNATION.**

26 **(B) A PERSON WHO VIOLATES THIS SECTION IS GUILTY OF A MISDEMEANOR
27 AND ON CONVICTION IS SUBJECT TO IMPRISONMENT NOT EXCEEDING 1 YEAR OR A
28 FINE NOT EXCEEDING \$500 OR BOTH.**

29 **(C) (1) SUBJECT TO PARAGRAPH (2) OF THIS SUBSECTION, IN A
30 PROSECUTION UNDER THIS SECTION, IT IS AN AFFIRMATIVE DEFENSE OF DURESS IF
31 THE DEFENDANT COMMITTED THE ACT AS A RESULT OF BEING A VICTIM OF AN ACT
32 OF ANOTHER IN VIOLATION OF TITLE 3, SUBTITLE 11 OF THIS ARTICLE OR THE

2 (a) A person convicted of prostitution under [§ 11–306] **§ 11–303** of the Criminal
3 Law Article may file a motion to vacate the judgment if, when the person committed the
4 act or acts of prostitution, the person was acting under duress caused by an act of another
5 committed in violation of [the prohibition against human trafficking under
6 § 11–303] **TITLE 3, SUBTITLE 11** of the Criminal Law Article or **THE PROHIBITION**
7 **AGAINST HUMAN TRAFFICKING** under federal law.

8 10–110.

9 (a) A person may file a petition listing relevant facts for expungement of a police
10 record, court record, or other record maintained by the State or a political subdivision of
11 the State if the person is convicted of:

12 (1) a misdemeanor that is a violation of:

13 (xiv) [§ 11–306(a)] **§ 11–303, § 11–306, OR § 11–307** of the Criminal
14 Law Article;

15 10–301.

16 (f) “Shieldable conviction” means a conviction of one of the following crimes:

17 (12) a prostitution offense under [§ 11–306(a)(1)] **§ 11–303** of the Criminal
18 Law Article if the conviction is for prostitution and not assignation.

19 11–701.

20 (p) “Tier II sex offender” means a person who has been convicted of:

21 (2) conspiring to commit, attempting to commit, or committing a violation
22 of **§ 3–1102, § 3–1103, § 11–303, § 11–305, [or] § 11–306, OR § 11–307** of the Criminal
23 Law Article, if the intended prostitute or victim is a minor;

24 13–501.

25 (g) “Human trafficking law” means § 3–324, **§ 3–1102, § 3–1103, § 11–207, [§**
26 **11–303,] § 11–304, and § 11–305** of the Criminal Law Article.

27 13–502.

28 The following are subject to forfeiture:

29 (1) except as provided in § 13–503 of this subtitle, a motor vehicle used in

1 connection with a violation of and conviction under [§ 11-303] § 3-1102 OR § 3-1103 of
2 the Criminal Law Article;

3 (2) money used in connection with a violation of and conviction under the
4 human trafficking law, found in close proximity to or at the scene of the arrest for a violation
5 of the human trafficking law; and

6 (3) except as provided in § 13-503 of this subtitle, real property used in
7 connection with a violation of and conviction under [§ 11-303] § 3-1102 OR § 3-1103 of
8 the Criminal Law Article.

9 13-503.

10 (a) Property or an interest in property described in § 13-502(1) or (3) of this
11 subtitle may not be forfeited if the owner establishes by a preponderance of the evidence
12 that the violation of the human trafficking law was committed without the owner's actual
13 knowledge.

14 (b) (1) A motor vehicle for hire in the transaction of business as a common
15 carrier or a motor vehicle for hire may not be seized or forfeited under this subtitle unless
16 it appears that the owner or other person in charge of the motor vehicle was a consenting
17 party or privy to a violation of the human trafficking law.

18 (2) A motor vehicle may not be forfeited under this subtitle for an act or
19 omission that the owner shows was committed or omitted by a person other than the owner
20 while the person other than the owner possessed the motor vehicle in criminal violation of
21 federal law or the law of any state.

22 (c) Subject to subsection (d) of this section, real property used as the principal
23 family residence may not be forfeited under this subtitle unless one of the owners of the
24 real property was convicted of a violation of [§ 11-303] § 3-1102 OR § 3-1103 of the
25 Criminal Law Article or of an attempt or conspiracy to violate [§ 11-303] § 3-1102 OR §
26 3-1103 of the Criminal Law Article.

27 (d) Real property used as the principal family residence by a husband and wife
28 and held by the husband and wife as tenants by the entirety may not be forfeited unless:

29 (1) the property was used in connection with a violation of [§ 11-303]
30 § 3-1102 OR § 3-1103 of the Criminal Law Article or with an attempt or a conspiracy to
31 violate [§ 11-303] § 3-1102 OR § 3-1103 of the Criminal Law Article; and

32 (2) both the husband and wife are convicted of a violation of [§ 11-303] §
33 3-1102 OR § 3-1103 of the Criminal Law Article or of an attempt or conspiracy to violate
34 [§ 11-303] § 3-1102 OR § 3-1103 of the Criminal Law Article.

35 13-507.

1 (a) A seizing authority may seize a motor vehicle used in violation of [§ 11-303]
2 **§ 3-1102 OR § 3-1103** of the Criminal Law Article and recommend forfeiture to the
3 forfeiting authority if the total circumstances of the case as listed in subsection (b) of this
4 section dictate that seizure and forfeiture are justified.

5 (b) Circumstances to be considered in deciding whether seizure and forfeiture are
6 justified include:

7 (1) evidence that the motor vehicle was acquired by use of proceeds from a
8 transaction involving a violation of [§ 11-303] **§ 3-1102 OR § 3-1103** of the Criminal Law
9 Article;

10 (2) the circumstances of the arrest; and

11 (3) the way in which the motor vehicle was used.

12 13-508.

13 (a) The chief law enforcement officer of the seizing authority that seizes a motor
14 vehicle used in violation of [§ 11-303] **§ 3-1102 OR § 3-1103** of the Criminal Law Article
15 may recommend to the appropriate forfeiting authority in writing that the motor vehicle be
16 forfeited only if the officer:

17 (1) determines from the records of the Motor Vehicle Administration the
18 names and addresses of all registered owners and secured parties as defined in the Code;

19 (2) personally reviews the facts and circumstances of the seizure; and

20 (3) personally determines, according to the standards listed in § 13-507 of
21 this subtitle, and represents in writing that forfeiture is warranted.

22 13-514.

23 Except as provided in § 13-517(c) of this subtitle, if property is seized under
24 § 13-504(2)(iv) of this subtitle because there is probable cause to believe that the property
25 is directly or indirectly dangerous to health or safety and that the property was or will be
26 used to violate [§ 11-303] **§ 3-1102 OR § 3-1103** of the Criminal Law Article, forfeiture
27 proceedings under this subtitle shall be filed promptly.

28 13-518.

29 (a) A complaint seeking forfeiture shall contain:

30 (7) if the forfeiting authority seeks to forfeit a lienholder's interest in
31 property, an allegation that the lien was created with actual knowledge that the property

1 was being or was to be used in violation of [§ 11-303] § 3-1102 OR § 3-1103 of the
2 Criminal Law Article;

3 13-522.

4 Except as provided in §§ 13-503 and 13-524 of this subtitle, an owner's interest in
5 real property may be forfeited if the owner of the real property is convicted of violating [§
6 11-303] § 3-1102 OR § 3-1103 of the Criminal Law Article or attempting or conspiring to
7 violate [§ 11-303] § 3-1102 OR § 3-1103 of the Criminal Law Article.

8 13-524.

9 If an owner of real property used as the principal family residence is convicted under
10 [§ 11-303] § 3-1102 OR § 3-1103 of the Criminal Law Article or is convicted of an attempt
11 or conspiracy to violate [§ 11-303] § 3-1102 OR § 3-1103 of the Criminal Law Article and
12 the owner files an appeal of the conviction, the court shall stay forfeiture proceedings under
13 § 13-503 of this subtitle against the real property during the pendency of the appeal.

14 13-525.

15 (a) (1) Except as provided in subsection (b) of this section, there is a rebuttable
16 presumption that property or part of a property in which a person has an ownership interest
17 is subject to forfeiture as proceeds, if the State establishes by clear and convincing evidence
18 that:

19 (i) the person was convicted of violating [§ 11-303] § 3-1102 OR §
20 3-1103 of the Criminal Law Article or attempting or conspiring to violate [§ 11-303] §
21 3-1102 OR § 3-1103 of the Criminal Law Article;

22 (ii) the property was acquired by the person during the violation or
23 within a reasonable time after the violation; and

24 (iii) there was no other likely source for the property.

25 13-528.

26 (c) (1) If the court determines that the forfeited property is subject to a valid
27 lien created without actual knowledge of the lienholder that the property was being or was
28 to be used in violation of [§ 11-303] § 3-1102 OR § 3-1103 of the Criminal Law Article,
29 the court shall order that the property be released within 5 days to the first priority
30 lienholder.

32 2-412.

1 (c) Police employees may not act within the limits of a municipal corporation that
2 maintains a police force except:

3 (11) when conducting investigations relating to or otherwise enforcing

5 11-303, 11-304, 11-305, [and] 11-306, **AND 11-307** of the Criminal Law Article;
