## A BILL ENTITLED

## 1 AN ACT concerning

## 2 State Procurement – Maryland Food for Maryland Institutions Task Force

3 FOR the purpose of establishing the Maryland Food for Maryland Institutions Task Force; 4 providing for the composition, chair, and staffing of the Task Force; prohibiting a  $\mathbf{5}$ member of the Task Force from receiving certain compensation, but authorizing the 6 reimbursement of certain expenses; requiring the Task Force to study and make 7 recommendations regarding certain matters; requiring the Task Force to report its 8 findings and recommendations to the Governor and certain committees of the 9 General Assembly on or before a certain date; defining a certain term; providing for 10 the termination of this Act; and generally relating to the Maryland Food for 11 Maryland Institutions Task Force.

### 12 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, 13 That:

- 14 (a) In this section, "locally grown food" means food grown in the State.
- 15 (b) There is a Maryland Food for Maryland Institutions Task Force.
- 16 (c) The Task Force consists of the following members:
- 17 (1) one member of the Senate of Maryland, appointed by the President of18 the Senate;
- 19 (2) one member of the House of Delegates, appointed by the Speaker of the
- 20 House;
- 21 (3) the Secretary of General Services, or the Secretary's designee;
- 22 (4) the Executive Secretary of the Board of Public Works, or the Executive

The Task Force shall: 19 (g) 20(1)study Maryland's procurement statutes and regulations to identify 21changes necessary to increase the procurement of locally grown food under State contracts; 22(2)identify opportunities for local governments to participate in State 23contracts for food: 24explore the role of unbundling State contracts to create greater (3)opportunities for Maryland farmers to bid; 2526review procurement processes used by public and private institutions (4)27in the State that have successfully increased their procurement of locally grown food; 28identify and make recommendations regarding achievable benchmarks (5)29for increasing the percentage of State food-budget dollars spent on locally grown food by 30 2021, 2023, 2025, and 2027, with subtargets within different agricultural sectors; 31(6)identify federal and private funding sources for developing the

1 infrastructure necessary to achieve benchmarks for increasing the percentage of State2 food-budget dollars spent on locally grown food;

3 (7) assess current and potential Maryland agricultural production, in 4 terms of crop opportunities and volume;

5 (8) assess the value and logistics of including reciprocal preferences for 6 farms located in the region, but outside Maryland, in benchmarks for purchasing locally 7 grown food; and

- (9) make recommendations regarding:

9 (i) the development of a system for tracking and reporting the 10 percentage of State food-budget dollars spent on locally grown food to ensure that 11 benchmarks are being met;

(ii) technical assistance that may be needed from the Department of
 Agriculture, the University of Maryland Extension, or other institutions in order to support
 local farmers in meeting food safety and other requirements to engage in State institutional
 procurement opportunities;

(iii) technical assistance that may be needed by procurement officers
 and other purchasers in order to meet benchmarks for purchasing locally grown food;

(iv) possible changes to the 5% price preference for locally grown food
established under § 14–407 of the State Finance and Procurement Article;

20 (v) the structure of contracts for the protection of farmers and State 21 institutions in the case of crop failure or unexpected surplus;

22 (vi) creating opportunities for small and medium-size farms as well 23 as large farms seeking to diversify their current crops in order to compete for State 24 contracts;

(vii) creating opportunities in State procurement processes for new
 farmers, women farmers, minority farmers, and veteran farmers;

(viii) supporting farmers involved in State procurement to engage in
the Maryland Healthy Soils Program and other environmental programs;

(ix) other opportunities within State purchasing to increase the
 market for Maryland farmers, including special events and office purchases; and

31 (x) opportunities for increasing transparency in the supply chain 32 from farm to institution.

33 (h) On or before January 1, 2020, the Task Force shall report its findings and

- 4 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect June 5 1, 2019. It shall remain effective for a period of 1 year and, at the end of May 31, 2020, this
- 6 Act, with no further action required by the General Assembly, shall be abrogated and of no
- 7 further force and effect.
