17	WHEREAS, Preservation of Maryland's irreplaceable heritage is intrinsically
18	valuable; and
19	WHEREAS, Historic preservation can result in substantial economic benefit, as well
20	as significant economic cost; and
21	WHEREAS, The disposal of excess and underutilized historic real property by state
22	and federal government agencies is often challenged by competing stakeholder interests,
23	regulatory constraints, costly environmental requirements, geographical location, and
24	design; and
25	WHEREAS, It is in the public interest to identify solutions in support of the
26	redevelopment and adaptive reuse of excess historic real property in a manner that is
27	economically feasible, results in positive preservation outcomes, supports local community
