11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit length to visible area)

CMIs location at 6040 Southport Drive was designed in 1992 to help people with serious mental illness transition out of State hospitals into the community. While no significant upgrades have been made to this facility since it opened, the agency has grown significantly to include a large continuum of services for adults with mental illness and co-occurring disorders. As a result, the space no longer meets clients needs or adequately supports current programs. CMI is requesting funding to support renovation of the Southport Hub to achieve greater functionality and cost-efficiencies through: 1) upgraded structures and facilities; 2) trauma-informed client treatment and meeting spaces; 3) accessible restrooms and elevator; and 4) new flooring to prevent falls.

28. Comments

Our organization consistently innovates to serve our community in the most effective and impactful

way possible. CMI is proud to partner with a variety of organizations. Some highlights include:

- 1.CMI collaborates and receives support from three churches near Southport: St. Mark's Presbyterian, St. Lukes Episcopal Church, and Bethesda United Methodist Church.

 2.In order to ensure effective employer relationships, CMI maintains partnerships with approximately 300 businesses for the Vocational Program which has offices at this location.

 3.Maryland Legal Aid services are offered at Hubs weekly; renovations will allow for more office space for other similar partnerships.
- 4.Montgomery County and Nexus Montgomery work in partnership with CMI to offer training to the community on selected behavioral healthcare related topics and the renovations will allow for more training and education space options.

CMI has recently renovated two other Hub locations in Rockville and Silver Spring to expand access to services with improved treatment space that is trauma informed. Creating a Trauma Informed Care (TIC) environment for clients and staff not only focuses on treatment methods used in therapy, but extends to the structure and design of the environment. The goal of TIC is to create a new experience that is emotionally, psychology and physically safe and healing. This includes space designs that allow for specialized waiting areas to improve clients feelings of safety and feeling less vulnerable in the space, as well as increasing office space size, improving workflow in the building by partnering like programs, and moving our most confidential program to the second floor for a more soothing environment. Another goal of the TIC-based redesign is to decrease the "institutional" feel and create a more comforting space to promote healing. Once the Southport Hub renovations are complete, CMI will continue to include regular capital expenses and a special reserve in our annual budget to maintain the health and safety of clients and staff that use this property. In addition, St. Luke's will provide space in their church for staff and service relocation during the renovation phase. Beginning in Fiscal Year 2020, CMI will renovate the Southport Hub which is a central location to nearly 600 clients each year offering a Life Skills Program, and an Outpatient Mental Health Clinic. A variety of classes and groups are offered: Cooking, Employment Services, group therapy, and Art Studio time and support.

The community impact of renovating and improving this facility will include:

Increasing treatment space to serve at least 100 more clients each year

Support for CMIs commitment to Trauma-Informed Care

Reduced hospitalizations

Reduced incarcerations

Reduced poverty and homelessness

Increased client self-sufficiency and employment

Improved client quality of life
