To. Description and Furpose of Organization (Limit length to visible area)

CASA is the foremost Latino and immigrant organization in the mid-Atlantic region and a national leader in immigrant and working-class families have the supports necessary for full participation in society. CASA was founded in 1985 and its mission is to create a more just society by building power and improving the quality of life in working class and immigrant communities. CASA starts with families and communities, and builds out to achieve collective impact at the state, regional and national levels. CASA has 7 locations throughout Maryland, as well as a presence in southcentral PA and northern VA. CASA has nearly 100,000 all-time members and serves over 37,000 people annually. We seek to empower immigrant families; ensure youth successfully transition to adulthood; expand good jobs, housing, and health and safety; and transform neighborhoods.

11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit length to visible area)

CASA operates a welcome center in Rockville at a county-owned facility. This is part of a partnership between CASA and Montgomery County to provide employment & training services to low-income workers. At this center, over 200 workers were placed in nearly 3,000 jobs in 2018. The building currently includes 6,800 square-feet of unused space. At the request of the county, CASA created a design for the vacant space to expand vocational training opportunities for workers, including a health training lab and equipment, maintenance mock rooms, HVAC and electrical training labs, and additional classroom space. CASA began phase 1 of renovations in FY19, and requests \$250,000 from the State, to be matched by \$250,000 from the County, to complete phase 2 of renovations, renovating the remaining 4,400 square feet of available unused space, and fully finishing 2,100 SF of that same space for use as the multi-use training classroom and HVAC classroom & training lab.

28. Comments

CASA has operated welcome centers in Maryland since 1994 in response to growing numbers of contingent workers seeking work at unofficial hiring sites. Working in partnership with local governments, CASA established centers that provide job placement services, educational classes, financial services and supports, legal services, ESOL (English for Speakers of Other Languages) instruction for workers and their families. CASA currently operates Welcome Centers in Silver Spring, Wheaton, Rockville, Baltimore, and Langley Park. Through these centers we place workers in 11,000 jobs annually, generating more than \$3.3M in annual earnings for workers and their families.

One of the major obstacles for low-wage workers, especially immigrant workers, in achieving economic self-sufficiency and longer-term employment is vocational skills and language skills. As such, additional training space to provide instruction in additional areas such as Building Maintenance Engineering, solar panel installation, and additional trainings in the health care industry, as well as expansion of ESOL instruction, would expand workforce opportunities for low-wage workers, thus resulting in improved job placement, retention, and earnings metrics.

Through CASAs partnership with the County to provide employment and training services to low-income workers, CASA currently operates a Rockville Welcome Center at a county-owned facility at 14645 Rothgeb Drive. The building was previously used by the Humane Society, and includes 6,800 square-feet of unused space. A year ago, CASA was approached by the County to propose an expansion of vocational training and educational programming by utilizing the vacant space and worked with Encore Sustainable Design LLC to lay out a two-phase plan. Last year CASA raised \$200,000 (\$100,000 from the County and \$100,000 in matching funds in a State Bond Bill) to fund phase 1 which will be completed by June 2019.

CASA respectfully requests \$250,000 from the County to fund half of phase 2, matching a request of the same amount in a State Bond Bill. With a total of \$500,000, in phase 2 CASA will renovate the remaining 4,400 square feet of available space, fully finishing the multiuse training classroom and HVAC classroom and training lab, and will also renovate the space for the healthcare simulation lab.
