1 AN ACT concerning

Sexual Solicitation of a Minor – Solicitation Through Parent, Guardian, or Custodian – Prohibition and Penalties

- FOR the purpose of prohibiting a person from knowingly and with a certain intent soliciting
 the consent of a parent, guardian, or custodian of a minor, or a person believed to be
 <u>law enforcement officer posing as</u> a parent, guardian, or custodian of a minor, to
 engage in certain prohibited sexual acts with the minor; establishing and altering
 certain penalties; making a technical change; and generally relating to sexual
 solicitation of a minor.

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1 (a) In this section, "solicit" means to command, authorize, urge, entice, request, 2 or advise a person by any means, including:

3	(1)	in person;
4	(2)	through an agent or agency;
5	(3)	over the telephone;
6	(4)	through any print medium;
7	(5)	by mail;
8	(6)	by computer or Internet; or
9	(7)	by any other electronic means.

10 (b) (1) A person may not, with the intent to commit a violation of § 3–304[, § 11 3–306,] or § 3–307 of this subtitle or § 11–303, § 11–304, § 11–305, § 11–306, or § 11–307 12 of this article, knowingly solicit a minor, or a law enforcement officer posing as a minor, to 13 engage in activities that would be unlawful for the person to engage in under § 3–304[, § 14 3–306,] or § 3–307 of this subtitle or § 11–303, § 11–304, § 11–305, § 11–306, or § 11–307 15 of this article.

16(2) A PERSON MAY NOT, WITH THE INTENT TO COMMIT A VIOLATION OF § 3–304 OR § 3–307 OF THIS SUBTITLE OR § 11–303, § 11–304, § 11–305, § 11–306, 17OR § 11-307 OF THIS ARTICLE, KNOWINGLY SOLICIT THE CONSENT OF A PARENT, 18GUARDIAN, OR CUSTODIAN OF A MINOR, OR A PERSON BELIEVED TO BE LAW 19 20ENFORCEMENT OFFICER POSING AS A PARENT, GUARDIAN, OR CUSTODIAN OF A 21MINOR, TO ENGAGE IN ACTIVITIES WITH THE MINOR THAT WOULD BE UNLAWFUL 22FOR THE PERSON TO ENGAGE IN UNDER § 3–304 OR § 3–307 OF THIS SUBTITLE OR § 11-303, § 11-304, § 11-305, § 11-306, OR § 11-307 OF THIS ARTICLE. 23

- 24 (c) A violation of this section is considered to be committed in the State for 25 purposes of determining jurisdiction if the solicitation:
- 26 (1) originated in the State; or
- 27 (2) is received in the State.

28 (d) A person who violates this section is guilty of a felony and on conviction is 29 subject to:

30 (1) FOR A FIRST OFFENSE, imprisonment not exceeding 10 years or a fine 31 not exceeding \$25,000 or both; AND

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1 (2) FOR A SECOND OR SUBSEQUENT OFFENSE, IMPRISONMENT NOT 2 EXCEEDING 20 YEARS OR A FINE NOT EXCEEDING \$50,000 OR BOTH.

3 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect 4 October 1, 2020.
