## HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

1 A House Joint Resolution concerning

2 **2026 FIFA World Cup – Protection of Human Rights**

3 FOR the purpose of supporting the fundamental requirements for United 2026 as laid out  
4 in FIFA’s “Proposal for a United Human Rights Strategy”; and encouraging certain  
5 persons to provide certain atmospheres, experiences, and policies for certain  
6 individuals at the 2026 FIFA World Cup.

7 WHEREAS, The Federation Internationale de Football Association (FIFA) Men’s  
8 World Cup Tournament is the largest sporting event in the world by every measurable  
9 factor; and

10 WHEREAS, The 2026 FIFA World Cup, hosted by the United States, Canada, and  
11 Mexico (United 2026) will be held in 16 cities with up to 12 of the bidding U.S. cities  
12 expected to be awarded tournament games; and

13 WHEREAS, Baltimore City and Washington, D.C. have been selected among the  
14 final 16 bidding cities, with M&T Bank Stadium and FedEx Field proposed as game sites  
15 and the fields at the University of Maryland, College Park Campus and Towson University  
16 as team practice fields; and

17 WHEREAS, FIFA estimates there will be between 300 and 500 million dollars of  
18 economic activity in each host city, affecting multiple sectors of the economy, including



1 hospitality, transportation, entertainment and broadcasting, event staging, security  
2 services, and construction, impacting State, county, and municipal employees; and

3 WHEREAS, Baltimore–Washington International Thurgood Marshall Airport is  
4 strategically located for the arrival and departure of thousands of international fans; and

5 WHEREAS, FIFA and the host countries are committed to creating a new model and  
6 legacy for global sporting events, one that centers on human rights and labor rights within  
7 the framework for the games; and

8 WHEREAS, FIFA adopted a “Proposal for a United Human Rights Strategy”, which  
9 in part states that FIFA plans to ensure a commitment to the core standards of the  
10 International Labour Organization (ILO) and the Universal Declaration of Human Rights  
11 in its processes for conducting the 2026 FIFA games; and

12 WHEREAS, The human rights requirements for the 2026 FIFA World Cup are the  
13 most extensive ever contemplated for a mega sporting event to protect human rights and  
14 improve quality of life in key areas such as labor, procurement and supply chain, freedom  
15 of expression, women, children, LGBTQI+ community, indigenous peoples, people with  
16 disabilities, and people of diverse ethnicities, races, and religions; and

17 WHEREAS, The General Assembly of Maryland has passed laws directly in line with  
18 the requirements for bid cities for the 2026 FIFA games, including broad antidiscrimination  
19 and human rights protections, living wage and minimum wage requirements, prevailing  
20 wage requirements, and human trafficking protections and awareness, and has defeated  
21 right-to-work legislation; now, therefore, be it

22 RESOLVED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That the General  
23 Assembly supports the fundamental requirements for United 2026 as laid out in FIFA’s  
24 “Proposal for a United Human Rights Strategy”; and be it further

25 RESOLVED, That the General Assembly encourages all host stadiums, cities, ports  
26 of entry, and fan zones to provide the following for fans, spectators, players, officials, and  
27 volunteers at the 2026 FIFA World Cup:

28 (1) a fun, safe, inclusive, respectful, and tolerant atmosphere for everyone  
29 regardless of gender or gender identity;

30 (2) an accessible, inclusive, welcoming experience for people with physical,  
31 mental, and sensory disabilities or with limited mobility;

32 (3) policies to ensure that free speech and assembly, directly or indirectly  
33 related to preparing and hosting the 2026 FIFA World Cup, are guaranteed within the  
34 framework set by national and international law;

35 (4) an atmosphere that celebrates diversity and welcomes international  
36 fans and players, providing fundamental government protections and due process to every

1 person;

2 (5) policies to ensure that the ILO core standards – freedom of association,  
3 nondiscrimination, no forced labor, and no child laborers – are respected in relation to those  
4 working on any activity related to the delivery of the competition;

5 (6) policies to ensure that all employers, public and private, providing  
6 goods or services related to the delivery of the competition implement best practices on  
7 labor issues, adhere to labor laws, pay a living wage, and allow workers of any status to  
8 raise issues related to their employment; and

9 (7) policies to ensure that there is no human trafficking in connection with  
10 the event and raise awareness of trafficking prevention; and be it further

11 RESOLVED, That the General Assembly commits to the principles of FIFA’s  
12 “Proposal for a United Human Rights Strategy” for the 2026 FIFA World Cup and seizes  
13 this unique opportunity to support a blueprint for fundamental human and labor rights,  
14 transparency, inclusiveness, and sustainability for future development; and be it further

15 RESOLVED, That a copy of this Resolution be forwarded by the Department of
