2 Democracy Day

- FOR the purpose of designating December 23 as Democracy Day; and generally relating to Democracy Day.
  - WHEREAS, The Declaration of Independence, signed on July 4, 1776, stated that government is formed by the consent of the people, through which the rights to life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness can be sought in accordance with the belief that all are created equal; and
- WHEREAS, The ratification of the Declaration of Independence contributed to the start of the Revolutionary War, which inspired hundreds of thousands of patriots to fight for their liberty, despite great personal sacrifice, under General George Washington; and
- WHEREAS, While others urged him to become king, on December 23, 1783, George Washington stood before the Continental Congress in the Maryland Statehouse in Annapolis, thanked those assembled for the opportunity to lead the nation to independence and sovereignty, and eschewed power, stepping aside and setting the nation on a path of civil government "of, by and for the people" in what artist John Trumbull described as "one of the highest moral lessons given to the world"; and
  - WHEREAS, King George III, the monarch defeated in America's Revolutionary War, is claimed to have called Washington the "most distinguished of any man living" and "the greatest character of the age" for Washington's renouncement of absolute power on December 23, and historian Thomas Fleming called Washington's renouncement "the most important moment in American History"; and
- WHEREAS, George Washington's resignation decidedly ended America's era of monarchical rule, ushering in the era of American democracy; and



1	WHEREAS, The world's great act of statesmanship began in Annapolis, the capital
2	city of Maryland, where Washington's resignation speech now lies, providing all
3	Marylanders with a reminder of the sacrifice and devotion necessary to enshrine them with
4	the power of democracy; and

- WHEREAS, Democracy "of, by and for the people" suggested by philosopher John Locke 200 years earlier, was unique in the world at the time and remains elusive for many nations today; and
- 8 WHEREAS, Democracy continues to allow Americans to seek representation in their 9 government and pursue the rights and ideas declared many years ago, and must not be 10 forgotten; and
- WHEREAS, Trust in the people and the power of their vote led the United States to become a world leader; now, therefore, be it
- RESOLVED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That the General Assembly of Maryland designates December 23 as "Democracy Day" to encourage contemplation of the importance of service to American freedom and inspire active participation in democracy; and be it further
- RESOLVED, That a copy of this Resolution be forwarded by the Department of Legislative Services to the Honorable Lawrence J. Hogan, Jr., Governor of Maryland; the Honorable William C. Ferguson, IV, President of the Senate of Maryland; and the Honorable Adrienne A. Jones, Speaker of the House of Delegates.
