1 AN ACT concerning

2 **State Board of Professional Counselors and Therapists – Sunset Extension and**
3 **Program Evaluation**

4 FOR the purpose of continuing the State Board of Professional Counselors and Therapists
5 by extending to a certain date the termination provisions relating to statutory and
6 regulatory authority of the Board; repealing the requirement that the Board submit
7 a certain semiannual report to the Department of Legislative Services; requiring the
8 Board to submit a certain report to certain committees of the General Assembly on
9 or before a certain date and at certain intervals thereafter; requiring the report to
10 address the progress made in addressing the Board’s complaint backlog, adopting
11 certain regulations, and establishing a certain Alcohol and Drug Counselor
12 Subcommittee; and generally relating to the State Board of Professional Counselors
13 and Therapists.

1 Chapter 757 of the Acts of the General Assembly of 2018
2 Section 2(a) and (b)

3 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND,
4 That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

5 **Article – Health Occupations**

6 17–702.

7 Subject to the evaluation and reestablishment provisions of the Maryland Program
8 Evaluation Act, this title and all rules or regulations adopted under this title shall
9 terminate and be of no effect after July 1, [2021] **2026**.

10 **Chapter 756 of the Acts of 2018**

11 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That:

12 [(a) On or before October 1, 2018, and every 6 months thereafter until October 1,
13 2021, the State Board of Professional Counselors and Therapists, in consultation with the
14 Maryland Department of Health and the Department of Budget and Management, shall
15 submit to the Department of Legislative Services a report on the progress made
16 implementing the recommendations contained within the December 2017 publication
17 “Sunset Review: Evaluation of the State Board of Professional Counselors and Therapists”.

18 (b) The progress reports required under subsection (a) of this section shall
19 address:

20 (1) the efforts made by the Board, in conjunction with the Maryland
21 Department of Health and the Department of Budget and Management, to:

22 (i) obtain additional personnel resources to allow the Board to
23 conduct a systematic evaluation and triage of the Board’s complaint backlog;

24 (ii) prioritize complaints based on potential public safety risks; and

25 (iii) develop a plan to systematically address the complaint backlog
26 and implement strategies to prevent future backlogs;

27 (2) the practices adopted by the Board to improve the thoroughness,
28 completeness, and legibility of investigative notes and the progress made in moving to an
29 electronic system to track complaints and investigations;

30 (3) the development of concrete timelines for the duration of investigations,
31 wherein after a certain period of time, a case should be dismissed or advanced except under
32 specified circumstances;

1 (4) the progress the Board has made in adopting regulations as required
2 under subsection (c) of this section;

3 (5) the research and consideration the Board has given to extending the
4 use of education programs accredited by the respective professional accrediting
5 organizations for education requirements for licensed clinical professional counselors,
6 clinical alcohol and drug counselors, clinical marriage and family therapists, certified
7 associate counselors—alcohol and drug, and certified supervised counselors—alcohol and
8 drug;

9 (6) any progress made toward the implementation of the proposed
10 portability plan for professional counselors and levels of reciprocity or endorsement to other
11 levels of licensees or certificate holders in other states who have practiced for a specified
12 number of years, passed a state law exam, and passed either a specified national
13 examination or hold a specified national certification from a respective national
14 credentialing organization;

15 (7) the specific efforts have been undertaken to train Board staff in current
16 requirements for direct licensure or certification responsibilities, and cross-training for
17 additional licensure and certification responsibilities;

18 (8) the progress of the investigation by the Board into implementing an
19 online licensing and certification system that:

20 (i) allows applicants to submit applications electronically;

21 (ii) assists the Board in keeping accurate records of the number of
22 applicants, licensees, and certificate holders; and

23 (iii) tracks applications through the licensing and certification
24 process;

25 (9) whether the number and types of licenses and certificates currently
26 issued are necessary to protect the public or if a reduced number would adequately protect
27 the public and provide better access to services;

28 (10) the progress that has been made to implement systems to track
29 progress toward licensure and complaint resolution goals, in conjunction with the
30 Department of Budget and Management;

31 (11) the progress that has been made, in conjunction with the Maryland
32 Department of Health and the Department of Information Technology, to determine
33 whether the Board should be a part of the electronic licensing and disciplinary system;

34 (12) the progress the Board has made in determining whether it is more
35 appropriate for the Board or the State Board of Examiners of Psychologists to regulate the
36 practice of behavior analysis as required under subsection (d) of this section;

1 (13) the progress the Board has made in determining whether or not it
2 would be in the best interest of the State to regulate additional creative or expressive
3 counselors and therapists as required under subsection (e) of this section; and

4 (14) the progress the Board has made in determining a Board composition
5 that appropriately represents the professions credentialed by the Board while providing
6 the best protection to the public as required under subsection (f) of this section.]

4 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That:

5 (a) On or before October 1, 2020, and every 6 months thereafter until October 1,
 6 2025, the State Board of Professional Counselors and Therapists shall submit to the Senate
 7 Education, Health, and Environmental Affairs Committee and the House Health and
 8 Government Operations Committee, in accordance with § 2–1257 of the State Government
 9 Article, a report on the progress made implementing the recommendations contained
 10 within the December 2017 publication “Sunset Review: Evaluation of the State Board of
 11 Professional Counselors and Therapists”.

12 (b) The progress reports required under subsection (a) of this section shall
 13 address the progress that the Board has made:

14 (1) addressing the Board’s complaint backlog;

15 (2) adopting regulations as required under Section 2(c) of Chapter 756 of
 16 the Acts of the General Assembly of 2018 and Section 2(c) of Chapter 757 of the Acts of the
 17 General Assembly of 2018; and

18 (3) establishing an Alcohol and Drug Counselor Subcommittee as required
 19 under § 17–205(b)(7) of the Health Occupations Article.

20 SECTION 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect July
 21 1, 2020.
