The JCC operates two facilities in the Baltimore metropolitan area that each provide preschool, fitness & wellness, aquatics, cultural arts, inclusion programming, and after school care. The Peggy and Yale Gordon Center For Performing Arts is on tcampus of the Rosenbloom Owings Mills JCC and is recognized as Baltimore Countys premier performing arts center. The 550-seat Gordon Center serves over 30,000 patrons annually, drawing audiences predominantly from Baltimore County and Baltimore City. Every year the Gordon presents a season of professional regional, national and international performances consisting of live music, dance, family programs, and film. Accessibility to the arts is a core value of the JCC, so the Gordon Center tickets are priced to maximize sustainability and access.

11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit length to visible area)

The Gordon Center serves more than 30,000 people per year through its performance season, Gordon Center rentals, and as a venue for public, governmental, and community events. Many different public and governmental organizations use the Gordon Lobby as a meeting space for their community events. When the institution opened in 1995, the Gordon Lobby was not expected to serve as an event or community meeting space on a regular basis. However today, despite its prime location, easy access and abundant parking, the current Gordon Center lobby is not equipped with the necessary technology and functionality to serve the community in this role.

28. Comments

When the Gordon Center For Performing Arts opened almost 25 years ago, the lobby was not intended to serve as an event/meeting space for 75 to 150 people on a regular basis.

Despite offering the right location, size and layout, the Gordon Lobby currently lacks the necessary functionality to effectively meet the desires of the organizations who want to use the space. Some of the current challenges facing the Gordon Center include:

Technology: Designed in the mid-90s, the lobby was not intended to serve as a meeting space for the JCC and other community activities. Proposed tech upgrades involve an integrated system including large screen, projector, and sound.

Aesthetics and Functionality of the Lobby, Bathrooms and Backstage: The interior lobby, bathrooms and backstage remain unchanged from when the theater opened in 1995. Each of these areas require updating flooring, painting, lighting and furniture to serve the 30,000 people who patronize the Gordon Center on an annual basis. Today, selling concessions provides a viable stream of income for the theater. Part of the proposed upgrade involves expanding the concessions area to better serve demand.

From January 2019 through February 2020, the Gordon Center Lobby has hosted as many as 10 public governmental forums, Homeland Security trainings, free wellness seminars, meetings of the Anti-Terrorism Advisory Council and a Senior Expo through Baltimore County's Department of Aging. Most recently, the Gordon Lobby and theater served as one of the venues selected by County Executive Johnny Olszewski's Town Hall meetings. The evening brought together more than 225 Baltimore County citizens who gathered to hear more from the County Executive about his plans for the future. For that event, the Gordon Lobby was used to showcase many of the County's programs and agencies.

With funding from the State Bond Bill, the JCC will have the ability to upgrade this Baltimore County "gem" to ensure that it remains a vital and welcoming destination for more than 30,000 patrons per year.
