10. Description and Purpose of Organization (Limit length to visible area)							

Hampden Family Center is a community based provider of programs and services to alleviate poverty in our community. Services include Adult Basic Education and GED preparation classes; after school and summer enrichment and tutoring programs; computer classes for adults, exercise classes and nutritious meals for seniors; health fair, free flu shots: preventative health screenings and programs; individual and family counseling, support groups, assistance connecting individuals and families to public benefits including SNAP, utility assistance, WIC and support to our homeless population to receive mail and make necessary phone calls at Center. Outreach efforts include school backpacks, winter coats, clothing and food drives, Thanksgiving and Easter food baskets and community party and toys during the holiday season FY '19 we served 2,376 individuals.

11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit length to visible area)

The Hampden Family Center's renovations will improve the facility, maximize space, enhance and expand program offerings and grow our capacity as a service provider for Hampden's low income community. Improvements include: 1. ADA compliance with the installation of an elevator for movement between three floors, and a ramp for wheelchair access. 2. Handicap accessible restrooms on each floor. 3. Installation of water sprinkler system to improve public safety. 4.Upgrades to mechanical and plumbing systems, and to HVAC for energy conservation and reduced operating overhead. 5 Redesigned meeting spaces and expanded classrooms, including widened doorways for accessibility, for expanded capacity and greater privacy with soundproofing. 6. Enhanced technology capacity for key programs, including adult literacy, GED preparation, workforce training and job training.

28. Comments

The Hampden Family Center became fully operational in the newly renovated space in May 2017. The renovations have enabled the Center to expand its program and service delivery to best need the critical needs of the community while expanding community partnerships. The needs for the services offered have expanded dramatically increased and we are serving more folks now than ever. Several community groups utilize the space for monthly meetings and when there is a community issue/emergency that requires meeting space. For example there was a devastating fire in the Hampden community several years ago and many households were displaced. Community meetings were held at the Center and we received and distributed in kind donations on behalf of the fire victims and served as the fiscal sponsor for the Hampden Fire Fund. Two additional community support groups meetings are now held weekly.

We have been able to expand our community partners to include but not limited to Code: In the School providing computer science classes to children; Family & Children's Services of Maryland providing on site family and individual counseling; Keswick Wise & Well Center assists in program delivery for older adults, MedStar Union Memorial has expanded their community health services and programs.

We have served as host to to the BMA Outpost a mobile extension of the Baltimore Museum of Art and currently host the Hampden Branch of the Enoch Pratt Free Library while their branch undergoes capital renovations. This has enabled The Pratt to continue providing services to the community in addition to computer classes, Lawyers in the Library and book groups. Most recently, St. Marys Outreach Services is utilizing offices to provide support services to seniors.

We have also been met with significant financial challenges. While we have had a successful capital campaign and took a relatively small bank loan to fund the project we have directly been impacted by the changing tax laws. Our revenue has decreased and we have had to choose at times between raising operating and capital funds leaving us with a loan balance that needs to be satisfied by December 31, 2020. A bond bill would allow the Center to be free of a major financial liability to concentrate all efforts toward raising operating funds. We are an anchor for the community where all come for resources. We are serving more clients now than ever and provide
