28. Comments

The project that is located on City property that is part of the existing Riverfront Park on land that is accessible to the Laurel Museum. The Laurel Museum is owned by the City of Laurel but relies on members of the Laurel Historical Society to run its operations. The Museum offers a variety of summer camp programs as well as many other interpretative programs for adults and children. Currently programs are limited due to space constraints. This outdoor pavilion classroom will enable the Museum to expand it offerings and take advantage of the outdoor park area. In particular, the Museum will be looking to add an archaelogy dig site on the grounds that will inspire class and camp programs.

With Riverfront Park situated along the Patuxent River, the City of Laurel will be looking to expand its offerings as well to include outdoor recreation programs as well as informational lectures and workshops about the City's resiliency plans and flood plane protection. The City's Office of Emergency Management will be heading up programs to engage citizens in working with the City to learn about and manage the health of the Patuxent River and Chesapeake Watershed.

The City will also work with local environmental and other community groups to use the site for citizen meetings and activities in and around the park.

The City will be looking at opportunities to use alternative energy sources to power lighting, computer access stations, charging stations and other technology functions that will be installed in the outdoor classroom. The City would also like to use the space to explore other environmentally friendly programs such as rain gardens and a rain water collection site, pollinator gardens and explore opportunities to institute stormeater management techniques that help filter the runoff water that goes into the Patuxent River.
