Senate Bill 666 (Senator Lee)
Education, Health, and Environmental Affairs

Election Law - Time Off For Employee Voting

This bill requires every employer in the State to allow *any employee in the State* (in place of any employee who claims to be a registered voter in the State) a period of up to two hours absence from work to vote *in an election* (rather than only on Election Day) if the employee does not have two hours of continuous off-duty time during the time that the polls are open. The bill also repeals a requirement that the proof that an employee is required to furnish to their employer that they have voted or attempted to vote must be on a form prescribed by the State Board of Elections (SBE). The bill also adds a requirement that if the employee has voted or attempted to vote outside the State, the employee must furnish reasonable proof in a timely manner to the employer. **The bill takes effect June 1, 2020.**

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: None. The bill does not directly affect State finances.

Local Effect: The bill is not expected to materially affect local government finances.

Small Business Effect: Minimal.

Analysis

Current Law: Every employer in the State must permit any employee who claims to be a registered voter in the State a period not to exceed two hours absence from work on Election Day in order to cast a ballot if the employee does not have two hours of continuous off-duty during the time that the polls are open. The employer must pay the employee for the two hours absence from work. Each employee must furnish to the employer proof that

the employee has voted or attempted to vote. The proof that an employee has voted or attempted to vote must be on a form prescribed by SBE.

Background: In-person early voting at early voting centers, during an early voting period prior to Election Day, has been available in Maryland since the 2010 elections. In addition, same-day registration has been available at early voting centers since the 2016 elections, allowing a person to register to vote at an early voting center and then subsequently cast a ballot in the same visit. Same-day registration is also now available, beginning with elections in 2020, at polling places on Election Day, pursuant to Chapters 609 and 755 of 2019.
