Pharmacy Benefits Managers - Credentialing and Reimbursement

This bill establishes protections for pharmacies and pharmacists that participate in a pharmacy benefits manager's (PBM) or purchaser's network. The bill takes effect January 1, 2021, and applies to all policies, contracts, and health benefit plans issued, delivered, or renewed in the State on or after that date.

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: The Maryland Insurance Administration (MIA) requires contractual support to review revised PBM contracts in FY 2021 only. As there are no fees associated with filing contracts, revenues are not affected.

Local Effect: None.

Small Business Effect: Meaningful.

Analysis

Bill Summary: The bill prohibits a PBM or purchaser from, as a condition of participating in a PBM's or purchaser's network, requiring a pharmacy or pharmacist to renew credentialing more frequently than once every three years or charging a pharmacy or pharmacist a fee for initial credentialing or to renew credentialing. This prohibition does not apply to a requirement that a specialty pharmacy obtain national certification to be considered a specialty pharmacy. A PBM or purchaser may not directly or indirectly charge a contracted pharmacy, or hold a contracted pharmacy responsible for, a fee or performance-based reimbursement related to the adjudication of a claim or an incentive

program, regardless of whether it is specifically enumerated at the time of claim processing or reported on the initial remittance advice. A PBM or purchaser may not make or allow any reduction in payment for pharmacy services or directly or indirectly reduce a payment for a pharmacy service under a reconciliation process to an effective rate or reimbursement, including generic effective rates, brand effective rates, direct and indirect remuneration fees, or any other reduction or aggregate reduction of payments.

Current Law: A PBM is a business that administers and manages prescription drug benefit plans for purchasers. A PBM must register with MIA prior to providing pharmacy benefits management services. The Insurance Commissioner is authorized to examine the affairs, transactions, accounts, and records of a registered PBM at the PBM's expense.

Small Business Effect: Small business pharmacies and pharmacists, among other things, may not be required to renew their credentialing more than once every three years or pay a fee for credentialing and may not receive reductions in payment for pharmacy services under a reconciliation process under the bill.
