BY repealing and reenacting, with amendments, Article – State Finance and Procurement Section 12–105 Annotated Code of Maryland (2015 Replacement Volume and 2020 Supplement) BY repealing Article – State Finance and Procurement Section 12–110 Annotated Code of Maryland (2015 Replacement Volume and 2020 Supplement) SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND,

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

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The Council shall:

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- 1 (1) advise the Board on specific steps necessary to implement the 2 recommendations of the Task Force Report;
- 3 (2) monitor and report to the Board the progress of implementation of the 4 recommendations in the Task Force Report;
- 5 (3) establish subcommittees or working committees consisting of members 6 of the Council and interested parties to address or study specific issues;
- 7 (4) with regard to the procurement of health, educational, and social 8 services:
- 9 (i) effect and enhance communication between State units on 10 procurement matters, with an emphasis on disseminating information on current 11 developments and advances in procurement methods and management;
- 12 (ii) provide a forum for the discussion of specific procurement issues 13 and problems that arise;
- 14 (iii) advise the Board on problems in the procurement process and 15 make recommendations for improvement to the procurement process; and
- 16 (iv) review existing procurement regulations to determine whether 17 they fulfill the intent and purpose of the law, especially as the law relates to fostering 18 broad–based competition and making effective use of State funds for the delivery of health, 19 educational, and social services; and
- 20 (5) on or before December 31 of each year, report to the General Assembly, 21 in accordance with § 2–1257 of the State Government Article, on the Council's activities 22 and recommendations regarding the procurement of health, educational, and social services 23 by State agencies.]
- SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That it is the intent of the General Assembly that a business, or representative of a business, participating in the Procurement Improvement Council, will not be favored in, disfavored in, or disqualified from the selection of contracts with, or eligibility for benefits from, the State on the grounds of the business's role in the Council.
- SECTION 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect July 30 1, 2021.
