Civil Actions – Immunity From Liability – COVID-19 Exposure

- FOR the purpose of providing that an owner, a lessee, or a tenant of a premises is immune from certain civil liability relating to the exposure of others on the premises to COVID-19 under certain circumstances; applying this Act retroactively; defining a certain term; and generally relating to immunity from civil liability for the exposure of others to COVID-19.

- WHEREAS, The General Assembly is aware that lawsuits related to the COVID-19 pandemic are being filed across the country, and business and premises owners are unsure about what civil liability they may face as they begin to re-open their businesses and premises; and
- WHEREAS, Recommendations regarding how best to avoid COVID-19 infection change frequently, and are at times not based on well-tested scientific information; and
- WHEREAS, Business and premises owners have not historically been required to keep members of the public from being exposed to airborne viruses, bacteria, and germs; now, therefore,
- SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

- (a) In this section, "COVID-19" means, interchangeably and collectively, the coronavirus known as COVID-19 or 2019-NCOV and the SARS-COV-2 virus.
- (B) AN OWNER, A LESSEE, OR A TENANT OF A PREMISES IS NOT CIVILLY
 LIABLE FOR ANY ACT OR OMISSION RESULTING IN INJURY OR DEATH RELATING TO
 EXPOSURE OR ALLEGED EXPOSURE TO COVID-19 ON THE PREMISES IF THE
 OWNER, LESSEE, OR TENANT, OR AN AGENT OF THE OWNER, LESSEE, OR TENANT,
 ACTED IN GOOD FAITH TO FOLLOW AND ENFORCE ON THE PREMISES ALL FEDERAL,
 STATE, AND LOCAL HEALTH GUIDELINES APPLICABLE AT THE TIME OF THE
 EXPOSURE OR ALLEGED EXPOSURE.
- SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall be construed to apply retroactively and shall be applied to and interpreted to affect claims arising on or after the Governor declared a state of emergency and catastrophic health emergency related to the novel coronavirus and COVID-19 on March 5, 2020.
- SECTION 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect October 1, 2021.
