A BILL ENTITLED

1 AN ACT concerning

2 **Blueprint for Maryland's Future – Revisions**

3 FOR the purpose of altering certain policy and funding provisions relating to the Blueprint
4 for Maryland's Future; requiring the State Department of Education to submit
5 certain data to the Department of Budget and Management and the Department of
6 Legislative Services; specifying that the target per pupil foundation amount includes
7 educational technology costs; altering certain dates for the implementation of the
8 Blueprint for Maryland's Future; altering the amount of a certain personnel grant;
9 altering the proportion of the per pupil grant for the Concentration of Poverty School
10 Grant Program; requiring the State Department of Education to submit to the
11 Department of Budget and Management and the Department of Legislative Services
12 the percentage and number of students at each school eligible for free or reduced
13 price meals in a certain school year and the eligibility of each public school for a
14 certain grant; requiring each student who receives transitional supplemental
15 instruction to receive certain assessments for a certain purpose; altering certain
16 mandated appropriations; clarifying certain calculations; requiring certain
17 calculations to be made for certain appropriations for certain fiscal years; clarifying
18 that a reduction in certain local education aid includes certain amounts; requiring
19 the Governor to appoint certain members to the Accountability and Implementation
20 Board within a certain period of time; requiring a certain individual to appoint
21 certain members to the Nominating Committee within a certain period of time under
22 certain circumstances; requiring the Accountability and Implementation Board to
23 provide certain outreach and materials to certain individuals; requiring certain
24 school leadership training programs to include certain training; adding a date by
25 which each county board of education is required to report to the State Department
26 of Education certain information related to a 9th grade tracker system; adding a date
27 by which the State Department of Education is required to submit a certain report
28 on a 9th grade tracker system to the Accountability and Implementation Board and
29 the Maryland Longitudinal Data System Center; clarifying that a certain post college
30 and career readiness pathway includes a certain program, course, or courses; adding
31 that a certain post college and career readiness pathway may be provided through

 2 information to the State Department of Assessments and Taxation by a certain date;
 3 requiring a county board to use certain funding for a certain purpose to the extent
 4 authorized under federal law; authorizing a county board to retain certain funds;
 5 requiring a county board to report to the Accountability and Implementation Board
 6 and, under certain circumstances, the State Department of Education, the Governor,
 7 the General Assembly, and the Department of Legislative Services on certain
 8 spending on or before certain dates; requiring each county board to establish and
 9 implement a certain summer school program and provide certain tutoring in certain
 10 years; requiring each county board to report on implementation of a certain summer

28 and is still in effect, **USING THE ASSESSED VALUE OF REAL PROPERTY AS OF JULY 1**
29 **OF THE SECOND COMPLETED FISCAL YEAR BEFORE THE SCHOOL YEAR FOR WHICH**
30 **THE CALCULATION OF STATE AID IS MADE UNDER THIS SECTION**, “assessed value of
31 real property” does not include the lesser of:

32 1. The difference between the original base and the
33 assessable base of all real property in a development district that is subject to tax increment
34 financing under Title 12, Subtitle 2 of the Economic Development Article or Article II, § 62
35 of the Charter of Baltimore City as certified by the State Department of Assessments and

37 2. The quotient of the annual debt service for a tax increment

1 pledged to the tax increment financing bond multiplied by 100.

10 City, shall report to the Accountability and Implementation Board, established under §
11 5-402 of the Education Article, the State Department of Education, and in accordance with
12 § 2-1257 of the State Government Article, the Department of Legislative Services, on how
13 the county board will spend any funding retained under subsection (a) of this section in
14 fiscal year 2022.

15 (c) On or before December 1 each year in 2021 through 2023, each county board

17 § 2-1257 of the State Government Article, the General Assembly, and the Accountability
18 and Implementation Board on the county board's use of federal funding that was received
19 to address the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic on education and State funding received

23 (a) (1) In calendar years 2021 and 2022, each county board of education,
24 including Baltimore City, shall establish and implement a summer school program for
25 public school students to address the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic on education that:

26 (i) includes daily academic instruction in reading or math that is
27 aligned with the county board's curriculum;

28 (ii) limits the number of students assigned to each teacher in the
29 program;

30 (iii) establishes partnerships with local government, which may
31 include the local parks and recreation agency and library system, or community and
32 nonprofit organizations to provide student experiences other than academic instruction;

33 (iv) may incorporate the county's program for providing free and
34 reduced price meals in the summer;

35 (v) may provide student transportation services;

1 (vi) may offer incentive pay for teachers, including higher
2 compensation, loan forgiveness, or tuition assistance;

3 (vii) may offer incentive pay for students participating in the program
4 who are employed or participating in career training through the partnership;

5 (viii) prioritizes enrollment for students with the greatest learning
6 loss from the effects of the COVID–19 pandemic on education;

7 (ix) administers an educational assessment to each student in the
8 program prior to beginning the program and on completion of the program; and

9 (x) evaluates the effectiveness of the summer school program at the
10 conclusion of each year.

11 (2) In establishing the summer school program under paragraph (1) of this
12 subsection, a county board of education:

13 (i) is encouraged to include project–based learning, hands–on
14 learning, individualized instruction, and group or leadership activities; and

15 (ii) may not charge a fee to a student who is enrolled in the program
16 to recover credits.

17 (b) In each of the 2021–2022 and 2022–2023 school years, each county board of
18 education, including Baltimore City, shall provide tutoring and supplemental instruction
19 for public school students in grades 4 through 12 to address learning loss from the effects
20 of the COVID–19 pandemic on education that:

21 (1) aligns with the county board’s curriculum by grade and subject;

22 (2) limits the number of students to which a teacher may provide tutoring
23 or instruction in a single session to not more than four students;

24 (3) uses evidence–based programs and strategies that meet the
25 expectations of strong or moderate evidence as defined in the federal Every Student
26 Succeeds Act;

27 (4) may include peer–to–peer tutoring for middle or high school students;

28 (5) may include science or social studies tutoring for high school students;

29 (6) occurs during the school day, to the extent practicable;

30 (7) may occur outside of the school day, including on a weekend;

1 (8) may provide transportation to students;

2 (9) uses a pre- and post-assessment to evaluate a student's progress before
3 and after completing tutoring under this subsection; and

4 (10) evaluates the effectiveness of the tutoring program at the conclusion of
5 each school year.

6 (c) On or before October 1, 2021, and October 1, 2022, each county board of
7 education, including Baltimore City, shall report, in accordance with § 2-1257 of the State
8 Government Article, to the Legislative Policy Committee of the General Assembly on the
9 county board's implementation of the summer school program in that year, including:

10 (1) how many students the county board served through the program;

11 (2) the structure of the program, including the number of hours of
12 instruction provided each day, how instruction was delivered to students, and the
13 partnerships established to enhance the summer school program;

14 (3) the method the county board used to identify students with the greatest
15 learning loss;

16 (4) the budget and expenditures for the program; and

17 (5) the outcomes of the program for students, including academic progress
18 and other outcomes.

19 (d) On or before September 1, 2022, and September 1, 2023, each county board of
20 education, including Baltimore City, shall report to the Accountability and Implementation
21 Board and, in accordance with § 2-1257 of the State Government Article, to the Legislative
22 Policy Committee of the General Assembly on tutoring provided under subsection (b) of this
23 section in the immediately preceding school year, including:

24 (1) how many students the county board served through the program by
25 grade and the subject areas in which tutoring was provided;

26 (2) the method the county board used to identify students for tutoring;

27 (3) the budget and expenditures for the program;

28 (4) the models of tutoring provided to students; and

29 (5) data on student outcomes, disaggregated by the type of model used to
30 provide the tutoring.

31 SECTION 5. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That:

1 (a) Each county board of education, including Baltimore City, shall use funds
2 provided in fiscal years 2021 and 2022 to address trauma and behavioral health issues due
3 to the effects of the COVID–19 pandemic on students and their families and to identify and
4 provide necessary supports and services for students.

5 (b) To the extent practicable, county boards are encouraged to utilize
6 school–based health centers to coordinate and deliver services to students.

7 (c) Funds may be used under this section to train teachers and school staff to
8 recognize signs of student trauma or behavioral health concerns.

9 SECTION 6. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act is an emergency
10 measure, is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public health or safety, has
11 been passed by a ye and nay vote supported by three–fifths of all the members elected to
12 each of the two Houses of the General Assembly, and shall take effect from the date it is
13 enacted.
