10. Description and Purpose of Organization (Limit length to visible area)						

Elks Camp Barrett is a 501(c)3 non-profit, providing inclusive educational programs, yearround facilities and outdoor experiences which might otherwise be inaccessible. Located on 187 forested acres in Anne Arundel County, ECB has been operated by the Elks MD-DE-DC State Association for over 60 years. Funded predominantly by private donations through Elks Lodges from districts across Maryland, ECB serves a diverse population of children, families, and 50+ other non-profits and beneficial organizations including: financially disadvantaged and food-insecure children, accessibility and medically-challenged children and adults, Veteran-affiliated programs, First Responder training, Scout troops, regional drug awareness and recovery programs. ECB provides thousands (\$\$\$) in added-value annually through no cost or cost-subsidized programs and facilities use.

11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit length to visible area)

ECB is a multi-purpose, year-round facility featuring a Community & Dining Hall, Commercial Kitchen, Overnight Cabins, Activity Buildings, Pavilions, Swimming Pool, Sports Fields, Playground. Accessibility and operation of facilities relies on 2 reconstruction projects. 1) Community/Dining Hall Utility Lot: The 300-foot lot is the center of operations for ALL food delivery, waste removal, program equipment trailer storage, parking for staff and an army of volunteers. Shovel-ready: Resurface declining lot; install stormwater barriers, stabilizing retainers and drainage control. 2) Campus Walkway: The 1/2 mile-long paved walkway enables elder and handicap-accessibility to all building facilities. Repair will improve safety for mobility-challenged; improvement anticipated to expand access for +15% participants annually. Shovel-ready: Resurface and widen age-damaged walkway; extend walkway to newer handicapped-equipped cabin.

28. Comments

Demonstrating the Elks self-sufficiency and mission to serve a wide population of people and communities, 85% of our funding is historically from private donations, including from thousands of members of local Elks Lodges* in districts across Maryland. During the prior two years alone, the Elks invested significantly in long-term repairs and replacement for some of Camp Barrett's most widely-used facilities and equipment -- more than is being requested in this LBI.

But, Covid restrictions and closures have diminished both rental revenue and donor sources from 2020 through 2021, eliminating most sources of operating capital for a two-year time frame.** This has required an LBI for the first time ever to conduct restoration of essential infrastructure that is unfunded.

Elks Camp Barrett goal with 2021 LBI grant funding is efficient: a) to complete essential shovel-ready projects within a short 2021 time frame to capitalize on this use-restricted Covid period in order to minimize disruption to our operations which are year-round, not limited to summer; and b) to enable post-Covid private fundraising to directly, immediately fulfill our core mission of serving thousands of children, families and beneficial organizations for whom programs, facilities use and an outdoor experience might otherwise be inaccessible without our support.

**Staffing and operating budget levels in this fact sheet reflect pre-Covid documented levels and post-Covid first-year return. A significant portion of our program operations and maintenance is also performed by volunteers, which keeps operating expenses down.
