The mission of the St. Michaels Community Center, Inc. (SMCC), a civic hub of the Bay Hundred community since 1990, is to enhance the quality of life for Talbot County residents. SMCC provides educational, recreational and program opportunities for the enrichment of children, teens, seniors, and families, with a focus on services to the low income. SMCC offers housing, clothing, and food assistance in personal emergencies. A nutrition and health focus are reinforced with educational programs, community gardens, bags of food for area families, and a Community Cafe. Youth after school and summer camp program, together with senior services are a core commitment. SMCC expands and strengthens its community roots through collaboration and partnerships with other organizations in the area (YMCA,

S.M.Y.L.E., the Talbot County Senior Center, among others).

### 11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit length to visible area)

Design, construct, and capital equip a 5,000 sq. ft. unimproved 1940s lumber warehouse, and add a 700 sq. ft. 2nd story, to become a modern St. Michaels Community Center (SMCC). The renovated building will meet building code, ADA requirements, and for safety purposes, replace outdated and failing equipment with modern mechanical systems and IT systems Other serious deficiencies include abnormal water penetration into the foundation, plumbing deficiencies, and inadequate joisting for the second floor. The building renovated with modern equipped classroom and meeting spaces and a commercial kitchen will expand program participation from 8,200 people annually to 14,000.
