Hunting, Wildlife Conservation, and Outdoor Recreation – Funding, Promotion, Management, Licenses, Permits, and Stamps

4 FOR the purpose of altering the purpose of the Heritage Conservation Fund to include $\mathbf{5}$ acquiring interests in land that can be used by the general public for hunting; 6 establishing the Wildlife Conservation, Education, and Outreach Program to provide 7outreach and foster an interest in outdoor recreation and stewardship, hunting, and 8 wildlife conservation; establishing a stamp for hunting sika deer; authorizing a 9 nonresident attending a college or university in the State to purchase a resident 10 hunting license; altering the fees charged for certain hunting and trapping licenses, 11 permits, and stamps; codifying and altering the fees charged for a nonresident 12trapping license and a group furbearer permit; codifying the fee charged for an 13individual furbearer permit; authorizing a person to hunt migratory game birds on 14Sundays: altering the purposes for which the Wildlife Management and Protection 15Fund may be used; requiring the Department of Natural Resources, in consultation 16 with the Department of Agriculture, to develop a plan to address the overpopulation 17of deer in the State; requiring that a portion of an increase in certain funding be used 18 for new Position Identification Numbers for the Department of Natural Resources to 19 use in a certain manner and to create and fund a certain farmer cost-share program; 20and generally relating to hunting, wildlife conservation, and outdoor recreation.
