House Bill 1153 (Delegate Adams, et al.)

Behavioral Health Programs - Residential Programs - Food Service Facility Requirements

This bill requires the Maryland Department of Health (MDH) to adopt regulations that establish food service facility standards that are appropriate to programs that have fewer than 17 residents and are licensed as a (1) residential-low intensity level 3.1 program; (2) residential-medium intensity level 3.3 program; (3) residential-high intensity level 3.5 program; or (4) residential-intensive level 3.7 program.

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: MDH can likely adopt regulations within existing budgeted resources. Revenues are not affected.

Local Effect: Any change in local operations pursuant to the bill do not materially affect local finances.

Small Business Effect: Potential meaningful.

Analysis

Current Law: Exhibit 1 details the licensure requirements for residential-low intensity level 3.1, residential-medium intensity level 3.3, residential-high intensity level 3.5, and residential-intensive level 3.7 programs.

Exhibit 1 Residential Treatment Programs Specified under the Bill

Licensure Requirements Program Type Residential – Low provides clinically managed, substance-related disorder treatment in Intensity 1, 2 large and small halfway houses; (ASAM Level 3.1) to individuals capable of self-care but not ready to return to family or independent living; and • minimum of five hours per week of services directed toward preventing a relapse, applying recovery services, and reintegrating into the community. Residential – Medium • provides clinically managed, substance-related disorder treatment in a Intensity 1, 2 structured environment in combination with medium-intensity (ASAM Level 3.3) treatment and ancillary services to support and promote recovery; to individuals who are chronically alcohol- or other drug-dependent, do not need skilled nursing care, may have a history of multiple admission to substance related disorder programs, may have physical or mental disability resulting from prolonged substance-related disorder, and have been identified as requiring a controlled environment and supportive therapy for an indefinite period of time; and from 20 to 35 hours per week. Residential – High provides clinically managed substance-related disorder treatment in a Intensity 1, 2 highly structured environment with moderate/high-intensity treatment (ASAM Level 3.5) and ancillary services to support and promote recovery; and minimum of 36 hours of therapeutic services per week that are characterized by reliance on the treatment community as a therapeutic agent. Residential provides medically monitored, intensive substance-related disorder Intensive ¹ treatment in a residential intermediate care facility, as specified; (ASAM Level 3.7) minimum of 36 hours of the rapeutic services per week on a planned regimen of 24-hour evaluation, care, and treatment that meets the

¹ Program may provide withdrawal management services, as specified, if the license specifically authorizes.

² Program may provide an opioid treatment service, as specified, if the license specifically authorizes.

In general, pursuant to COMAR 10.15.03, food service facilities in the State must meet standards related to, among other things, food preparation and storage, standards for equipment and utensils, and requirements for areas of food preparation and storage. The person in charge (including a licensee or another person responsible for the operation of a food service facility) must ensure that the specified requirements are met.

Small Business Effect: Specified residential substance-related treatment programs may benefit from the establishment of appropriate food service standards under the bill.

Additional Comments: MDH advises that the bill will ensure equity among licensed residential behavioral health programs because not all jurisdictions currently enforce foods service facility regulations as a result of the regulations being lengthy and unclear.
