# Election Law – Election Disinformation <del>on Large Social Media Platforms</del> and <u>Improper Influence Related to Voting</u>

4 FOR the purpose of requiring each large social media platform to make reasonable efforts to prevent, detect, and remove accounts and posts that communicate election  $\mathbf{5}$ 6 disinformation in the State; requiring a large social media platform to report election 7 disinformation by providing certain information to the State Board of Elections 8 within a certain period of time after the large social media platform becomes aware 9 of an account or a post that communicates election disinformation: requiring the 10 State Board to take certain action as soon as practicable after receiving a report from a large social media platform concerning an account or a post that communicates 11 election disinformation the State Board of Elections to maintain a portal on the State 12Board's website that the public may use to report election disinformation; requiring 13 the State Board to conduct a periodic review of material submitted by the public 14 15through the portal and, to the extent necessary, issue corrective information or refer submissions to the State Prosecutor; defining "influence" for purposes of a certain 1617provision provisions of law related to offenses prohibiting improper influence related 18 to voting; and generally relating to election disinformation <del>on large social media</del> 19<del>platforms</del> and improper influence related to voting.
