4 FOR the purpose of altering the membership and terms of members of the Behavioral 5 Health Advisory Council; altering the membership of the Commission on Behavioral 6 Health Care Treatment and Access; requiring the Commission on Behavioral Health 7 Care Treatment and Access to meet jointly with the Council; requiring the 8 Commission, in coordination with the Council, to make recommendations regarding 9 the continuation of the State's behavioral health carve-out and the financing 10 structure and quality oversight necessary to integrate somatic and behavioral health 11 services and ensure compliance with the Mental Health Parity and Addiction Equity 12 Act in the Maryland Medical Assistance Program; and generally relating to the Behavioral Health Advisory Council and the Commission on Behavioral Health Care 13 Treatment and Access. 14


