BY repealing and reenacting, with amendments, Article – Education Section 18-303.1 Annotated Code of Maryland (2022 Replacement Volume and 2023 Supplement) SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows: Article - Education 18-303.1.



include in the annual budget bill an appropriation of \$5,000,000 to the Program.

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- 1 On or before December 1, 2020, and each December 1 thereafter, the 2 Commission and the Department shall report to the Governor and, in accordance with § 3 2-1257 of the State Government Article, the General Assembly, on the implementation of 4 the Program, including:
- 5 (1) The number of students from each local school system who were 6 prequalified for the Guaranteed Access Grant during each year of the Program;
- 7 (2)The race, disability status, and English language learner status of each 8 participating student who prequalified for the Guaranteed Access Grant each year of the 9 Program:
- 10 (3)The progress of each participating student through the Program, 11 including high school graduation, institution of higher education matriculation and 12 retention rates, and, if applicable, institution of higher education graduation rates;
- 13 **(4)** The potential for allocating additional funds for longitudinal data 14 collection of the number of students matriculating to institutions of higher education each 15 year, the number of students receiving retention services each year, and postsecondary 16 outcomes for those two categories of students;
- 17 The amount and quality of services provided by nonprofit organizations to participating students, including the use of college work-study students and high school 18 19 students as mentors and counselors;
- 20 The nonprofit organizations that received grants under the Program, 21 including any other entities that provided services such as institutions of higher education, 22 the business community, and local schools or local school systems;
- 23 (7)The amount of financial aid, in addition to the Guaranteed Access 24Grant, that participating students received each year that the students were enrolled in an 25institution of higher education; and
- 26 Findings and recommendations on the success of the Program and (8)27 whether funding for the Program should be continued or expanded.
- 28 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall be construed to 29 apply only prospectively and may not be applied or interpreted to have any effect on or application to the program administrator of the Next Generation Scholars of Maryland 30 Program for the fiscal year 2025 grant eyele.
- SECTION 3. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect 32 October 1, 2024, and shall be applicable beginning in fiscal year 2026. 33

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
