10. Description and Purpose of Organization (Limit length to visible area)							

Founded in 1853, the Y in Central Maryland (the Y) is a 501c3 charitable organization. Our mission is to develop each individuals full potential through programs that build a healthy spirit, mind, and body. We provide family-oriented, affordable, high quality programs that focus on building inclusive, connected communities through Youth Development, Healthy Living and Social Responsibility. The Ys vision is to build a more inclusive and connected Central Maryland community in which Y membership creates a sense of belonging, engagement, empathy, health, and well-being for all. People of all races, ages, faiths, gender, abilities, backgrounds and incomes are embraced and financial assistance is provided to actively engage the entirety of the community. This inclusion and connection will impact people and families more deeply across all of the Ys points of access.

11. Description and Purpose of Project (Limit length to visible area)

The septic system at the Greater Annapolis Y in Arnold was designed over 25 years ago to serve a much smaller clientele than the Y serves. While increased utilization has supported impressive health, youth development and community outcomes, the strain on the septic system leads to frequent backups creating operational disruption and environmental hazards. A 2108 study recommended elimination of the septic system in favor of connecting the building to the county sanitary system as a more reliable, cost-effective, and environmentally sound sewage management model in line with Anne Arundel Countys environmental goals. In 2023, we completed plans for the sewer line and submitted a permit package to Anne Arundel County and the State of Maryland. We anticipate the approval process will be completed before April 2024 and we will commence construction. Remediation is urgent to avoid closure of the entire facility and the loss of community services provided there.

28. Comments

When the Y purchased the Big Vanilla" in2013, the facility transitioned from a private, exclusive health club open to a small segment of the community to a full service Y focused on serving the entirely of the community. The Y is built around a membership model, in which all are welcomed into our inclusive membership community and there is a highly intentional focus on ensuring full community access, turning no one away due to the inability to pay. The Y charges relatively moderate membership fees, with Open Doors financial assistance provided for individuals and families with incomes up to three times the federal poverty level. The Y actively raises charitable contributions in the community to fund its Open Doors program.

Families participating in the Ys Head Start, Before & After School Enrichment, Preschool, Mentoring, and Community Schools Out-of-School Time programs all receive a full family membership while participating in the Ys youth development program. Open Doors ensures that cost is not a barrier to participation in Y programs and all community members have equitable access to social determinants of health such as chronic disease prevention, community-based health and wellness programs, summer camp, and volunteerism. This year the Greater Annapolis Y provided Open Doors support to more than 2,100 individuals.

The over-use of the septic system described above results in back-ups roughly twice a month. This results in closure of all or a portion of the facility, inhibiting delivery on our community mission. In addition, the failing septic system likely discharges untreated wastewater, which contains pathogens (e.g., E. coli), nutrients and other harmful substances directly into the groundwater or onto the ground and into surface waters. The age and over-capacity utilization of the Greater Annapolis Ys septic system presents an environmental hazard to the community, while also being a significant barrier to the Ys ability to carry out its mission in the community.

While the project isn't expected to result in any significant additional employment or membership; failure to complete the project may result in reduced employment or member access should the building need to close for any period of time.
