Public Health - Prohibition on Transfer of Human Immunodeficiency Virus - Repeal

This bill repeals the misdemeanor prohibition against and associated penalty for knowingly transferring or attempting to transfer HIV to another.

Fiscal Summary

State Effect: The bill is not anticipated to materially affect governmental operations or finances, including the work of the District Court.

Local Effect: The bill is not anticipated to materially affect local operations or finances.

Small Business Effect: None.

Analysis

Current Law: An individual who has HIV may not knowingly transfer or attempt to transfer HIV to another individual. A person who violates this prohibition is guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction is subject to a maximum penalty of three years imprisonment and/or a fine of up to \$2,500.

Additional Comments: The Judiciary advises that, from fiscal 2000 through fiscal 2020, there were a total of 146 charges and 14 convictions for knowingly transferring or attempting to transfer HIV across both District and circuit courts in the State. While the offense has been charged six times in the District Court over the last three fiscal years (two in 2021, four in 2022, and zero in 2023), there were zero convictions during this time period.
