1 AN ACT concerning

2 Public Health – Buprenorphine – Training Grant Program and Workgroup

- FOR the purpose of establishing the Buprenorphine Training Grant Program to assist
 counties with offsetting the cost of training paramedics to administer buprenorphine;
 including the Program as an authorized use of funding from the Opioid Restitution
 Fund; requiring the Maryland Office of Overdose Response to convene a workgroup
 to study access to buprenorphine in the State; and generally relating to
 buprenorphine.

1 (d) (1) The Fund is a special, nonlapsing fund that is not subject to § 7–302 of 2 this subtitle.

3 (2) The State Treasurer shall hold the Fund separately, and the 4 Comptroller shall account for the Fund.

5 (e) The Fund consists of:

6 (1) all revenues received by the State from any source resulting, directly or 7 indirectly, from any judgment against, or settlement with, opioid manufacturers, opioid 8 research associations, or any other person in the opioid industry relating to any claims 9 made or prosecuted by the State to recover damages for violations of State law; and

- (2) the interest earnings of the Fund.
- 11 (f) The Fund may be used only to provide funds for:

12 (1) programs, services, supports, and resources for evidence-based 13 substance use disorder prevention, treatment, recovery, or harm reduction that have the 14 purpose of:

(i) improving access to medications proven to prevent or reverse an
overdose, including by supporting the initiative to co-locate naloxone with automated
external defibrillators placed in public buildings under § 13–518 of the Education Article;

- 18 (ii) supporting peer support specialists and screening, brief 19 intervention, and referral to treatment services for hospitals, correctional facilities, and 20 other high-risk populations;
- 21 (iii) increasing access to medications that support recovery from 22 substance use disorders;

23 (iv) expanding the Heroin Coordinator Program, including for 24 administrative expenses;

25 (v) expanding access to crisis beds and residential treatment 26 services for adults and minors;

- (vi) expanding and establishing safe stations, mobile crisis response
 systems, and crisis stabilization centers;

(vii) supporting the behavioral health crisis hotline;

(viii) organizing primary and secondary school education campaigns
 to prevent opioid use, including for administrative expenses;

1 (ix) enforcing the laws regarding opioid prescriptions and sales, 2 including for administrative expenses;

3 (x) research regarding and training for substance use treatment and 4 overdose prevention, including for administrative expenses; and

5 (xi) supporting and expanding other evidence-based interventions 6 for overdose prevention and substance use treatment;

7 (2) supporting community-based nonprofit recovery organizations that 8 provide nonclinical substance use recovery support services in the State;

9 (3) evidence-informed substance use disorder prevention, treatment 10 recovery, or harm reduction pilot programs or demonstration studies that are not 11 evidence-based if the Opioid Restitution Fund Advisory Council, established under § 12 7.5-902 of the Health – General Article:

(i) determines that emerging evidence supports the distribution of
 money for the pilot program or that there is a reasonable basis for funding the
 demonstration study with the expectation of creating an evidence-based program; and

16 (ii) approves the use of money for the pilot program or demonstration17 study; [and]

18 (4) evaluations of the effectiveness and outcomes reporting for substance 19 use disorder abatement infrastructure, programs, services, supports, and resources for 20 which money from the Fund was used, including evaluations of the impact on access to 21 harm reduction services or treatment for substance use disorders and the reduction in 22 drug-related mortality; AND

23(5) THE BUPRENORPHINE TRAINING GRANT PROGRAM24ESTABLISHED UNDER § 13–5502 OF THE HEALTH – GENERAL ARTICLE.

25 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That:

26 (a) The Maryland Office of Overdose Response shall convene a workgroup to 27 study access to buprenorphine in the State.

(1) one member of the Senate of Maryland, appointed by the President ofthe Senate;
