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- According to the American Gaming Association, 22 states have land-based, riverboat, or racetrack casinos and video lottery facilities (excluding states with tribal gaming).
- The number of facilities in those states range from one racetrack video lottery terminal (VLT) facility in Maine to 256 casinos in Nevada.
- The Department of Legislative Services (DLS) has reviewed the gaming regulatory frameworks in a number of these states, with additional information found in the attached exhibit.

- Of the 12 states reviewed by DLS, most have a stand-alone gaming board or commission that regulates both VLTs and table games.
- However, among Maryland's neighboring states, Delaware and West Virginia both provide regulation of VLTs and table games through their lottery commissions.
- In most of these selected states, horse racing activities are regulated through a separate racing commission or commissions.
- The amount of compensation paid to gaming board/commission members in these states varies widely – members receive salaries in some states, while per diems are paid in most other states.
- With limited exceptions, the Governor generally appoints the members of the board/commission in the states examined.

¹The Colorado Constitution authorizes a tax of up to 40% on casino adjusted gross proceeds (AGP). The constitution states that the percentage shall be established annually by the Gaming Commission. Over the years, the commission has maintained a graduated tax structure in which casinos pay a higher percentage the more AGP they generate. This is designed to encourage a mixture of small-, medium- and large-sized casinos. The highest tax rate has reached a maximum of 20%. Under Amendment 50 passed by voters in 2008, if the commission decides to raise the tax rates higher than those in place on July 1, 2008, voters statewide would need to approve the increase.
