### REPORT:

Committee Vote: Favorable, 4-0 (In Favor: Council Members Davis, Taveras, Ivey and Turner)

The General Assembly Committee convened on February 11, 2020 to review, CR-2-2020, which expresses the County Council's support of the settlement offer made by the Historically Black Colleges and Universities Coalition ("HBCU Coalition") to resolve the lawsuit against the State of Maryland; and urging Governor Hogan and the members of the Maryland General Assembly to settle the HBCU Coalition lawsuit in accordance with the Court ruling and the offer made by the HBCU Coalition.

The State of Maryland has four Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs), including Bowie State University, located in Prince George's County; Morgan State University and Coppin State University, both located in Baltimore City, and; the University of Maryland Eastern Shore, located in Somerset County. These institutions are an essential part of the Maryland higher education system and they provide unique educational opportunities for large segments of the population of the State, as well as serving as economic engines in their communities and the State of Maryland.

Monica Best-James, Legislative Officer, provided a summary of the resolution, indicating that the settlement offer made by the HBCU Coalition consists of \$577 million over a ten-year period as compensation for the discriminatory practices that have impacted the HBCUs in Maryland. Ms. Best-James indicated that Baltimore City and the City of Bowie have passed similar resolutions. Adrienne Jones, Speaker of the Maryland House of Delegates, has introduced HB 1260, which requires the Governor to include \$577 million in the annual State operating budget in each of the fiscal years 2022 through 2031 to be allocated to the four HBCUs in Maryland based on an enrollment-driven calculation. The Committee's discussion included testimony in support from Sharon Blake (Morgan State University Alum), of the Maryland HBCU Advocates. Committee Chair Davis indicated his personal support as a proud graduate of the University of Maryland Eastern Shore, and Committee Director Kenneth Battle is a proud graduate of Morgan State University (Class of '84).

After the discussion, the Committee voted favorably on CR-2-2020 by a vote of 4-0.

WHEREAS, the State of Maryland (hereinafter "State") has four Historically Black					
Colleges and Universities (hereinafter "HBCUs"), including Bowie State University located in					
Bowie in Prince George's County, Maryland and the others are located within the greater					
Baltimore metropolitan region and on the Eastern Shore of Maryland; and					
WHEREAS, HBCUs are an essential part of the Maryland higher education system and					
they provide unique educational opportunities for large segments of the population of the State					
and Prince George's County; and					
WHEREAS, HBCUs serve as economic engines in their communities by employing					
Maryland residents; making countless contributions to the State's economy through the revenue					
that they generate; supporting the State's economic growth through the expenditures made by					

WHEREAS, the HBCUs are significant contributors to the social and cultural life of Prince

George's County and the greater Baltimore metropolitan region and the Eastern Shore of Maryland through their unique programs and curricula, athletic programs, and other special

their students, faculty, staff and alumni; and

events; and

WHEREAS, the United States District Court for the District of Maryland (hereinafter "District Court") opined in 2013 that the State had adversely impacted the HBCUs as a result of its unconstitutional and discriminatory practice of providing funding for the unnecessary duplication of academic programs in State supported, non-HBCU colleges and universities; and

WHEREAS, the District Court ordered in 2017 that the State of Maryland remedy the violations by establishing a set of unique and popular programs with appropriate funding for scholarships, marketing and recruitment at each of the State's HBCUs; and

WHEREAS, after several attempts at mediation, the HBCU Coalition recently offered to settle the case for \$577 million over a period of 10 years; and

WHEREAS, the Prince George's County Council affirms that the HBCUs success is important to the vitality of this county and the State; and

WHEREAS, the Prince George's County Council further affirm that we stand with alumni, students, faculty, staff and the community in support of Maryland's HBCUs.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the County Council of Prince George's County, Maryland, that the County Council supports the offer made by the Historically Black Colleges and Universities Coalition regarding the lawsuit against the State of Maryland and urges Governor Hogan and the Maryland General Assembly to reach a settlement in accordance with the District Court's rulings.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this Resolution be sent to the Governor of Maryland, the Attorney General of Maryland, President of the Senate, President Emeritus of the Senate, Speaker of the House, Chair of the Legislative Black Caucus, the President of Bowie State University, the President of the University of Maryland Eastern Shore, the President of Coppin State University; the President of Morgan State University and the honorable members of the Prince George's County Senate and House Delegations.
