The Maryland Assembly on School-Based Health Care (MASBHC) opposes *House Bill 152 – Budget Reconciliation and Financing Act of 2020.* This bill would reduce funding for the Maryland Community Health Resources Commission and behavioral health providers, which support the operations of school-based health centers.

Proposed Cut to the Maryland Community Health Resources Commission

The Commission has been critical in expanding school-based health center capacity across the state. School-based health centers provide primary care, behavioral health services, and dental services to low-income children in public schools. The Commission has supported school-based health centers by providing much needed start-up funding to establish new school-based health centers and expand critical services in existing centers.

The Commission has also taken responsibility for the essential role of staffing the Council on the Advancement of School-Based Health Center. This Council is charged with developing State agency policy to ensure school-based health centers have the opportunity to grow and become integrated with the broader health care system.

Proposed 2% Rate Reduction for Behavioral Health Providers

By design, school-based health centers are located in schools with high concentrations of poverty and act as a safety net provider, particularly for students who experience barriers to accessing health care services in the community. Through leveraging additional funding, including Medicaid reimbursement, school-based health centers have been able to improve access and quality of care for youth, particularly hard-to-reach and underserved populations and become a key component of the safety net. This is illustrated by recent data showing that during the 2017-2018 school year, nearly one-third of the over 52,000 visits provided in school-based health centers were for behavioral health servicesⁱ. Without a sufficient reimbursement rate from Medicaid, many school-based health centers would not be sustainable.



For these reasons, we would request that funding reductions in the BRFA to the Commission and Behavioral Health Providers be restored.
