Transport of a Body After Anatomical Gift - Gift - Prohibition

Re: SUPPORT FOR BILL#SB0917

We are students at Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine and Public Health writing in support of SB 0917, which would prohibit charging transportation fees to claim a body.

As medical and public health students, we entered school knowing that we would learn through the generosity of others, including the use of their bodies for us to learn intricate anatomical details. We were prepared to dissect cadavers, however, we were not prepared to learn that we'd be part of a centuries-long Maryland tradition of exploiting the bodies of the less fortunate for the benefit of medical science. Some of the bodies medical students in this state dissect come from individuals who passed away with no one to claim them, and some simply had families who could not afford to claim them from the state. These individuals are low-income, marginalized, and sometimes experiencing homelessness.

All bodies are legally required to be transported to a funeral home or the State Anatomy Board within 72 hours of death. This timeline means that bodies may be transported before the family even knows that their family member has passed away. In such a circumstance, being asked to pay for surprising transportation fees can make it difficult or impossible for families to receive and bury their loved one. On such a short time frame, families may not have the opportunity to claim their family member, much less come up with transportation fees. These fees, on top of the already high costs of funeral services, may prevent families from being able to bury their dead. Families throughout Maryland have expressed concern that their lack of funds may cause their loved one to become property of the state.[i],[ii],[iii]

We believe that all Marylanders should be given the opportunity to bury their loved ones, and that transportation fees should not prohibit family members from acquiring the body. Therefore, we ask you to support SB0197.
