RE: Senate Bill 752 – Public Health – Non–Controlled Substance Prescription Record System Program

POSITION: SUPPORT

Chair Kelley, Vice Chair Feldman, and Members of the Committee, please be advised that the Baltimore City Administration (BCA) **supports** Senate Bill (SB) 752.

Prescription drug monitoring programs can be powerful public health tools. For example, in response to the mounting opioid epidemic states set up prescription drug monitoring programs (PDMPs), statewide electronic databases to track all controlled substance prescriptions and notify prescribers of individual patient’s dispensed controlled substance medications and dosages.¹ The implementation of PDMPs was associated with changes in prescriber practices, less use of multiple providers by patients, and fewer hospital admissions for substance use treatment.²

Similar to PDMPs, SB 752 proposes creating a prescription drug monitoring program but for non-controlled substances. By allowing clinicians to track what other providers have prescribed through a statewide database, they can adjust their own prescribing practices accordingly to reduce duplicative prescriptions and guard against harmful medication interactions.

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In establishing a centralized database for non-controlled substances prescriptions, this bill could empower providers with the necessary information to improve prescribes practices and ultimately to improve patient safety and decrease health care costs for Maryland residents.
