**RE: Senate Bill 235: Criminal Law – Attempt to Commit Second–Degree Murder – Penalty**

**POSITION: Support**

Dear Chairman Smith and Members of the Judicial Proceedings Committee:

The Governor's Office of Crime Prevention, Youth, and Victim Services supports Senate Bill 235: Criminal Law – Attempt to Commit Second–Degree Murder – Penalty.

This legislation increases the maximum penalty for a person who attempts to commit murder in the second degree. Currently, individuals who are convicted of attempted second-degree murder are guilty of a felony and subject to 30 years imprisonment. This bill would increase the maximum penalty to 40 years.

In Maryland law, a murder is in the first degree if it is (1) a deliberate, premeditated, and willful killing; (2) committed by lying in wait; (3) committed by poison; or (4) or committed in the perpetration of or an attempt to perpetrate other specified crimes. Second-degree murder is a murder that does not meet all of the elements of first-degree murder. Chapter 515 of 2016 increased the maximum penalty for second-degree murder from 30 to 40 years. This legislation would bring the maximum penalty for attempted second-degree murder in line with this change.
