



HB 460 – Department of Human Services - Child Abuse Prevention - Online Course

Testimony of Joyce Lombardi, Director of Government Relations Baltimore Child Abuse Center

Position: **SUPPORT**

Baltimore Child Abuse Center, Maryland's first and oldest children's advocacy center, supports HB460.

This bill would require the Maryland Department of Human Services to post on its website a free online course on the identification, prevention, and reporting of child abuse. DHS's website currently has general information on reporting suspected child abuse or neglect. It does not explain the law in detail, nor is it interactive, nor linked to continuing education credit. Training is key to preventing child abuse. Over 60 percent of reports of child abuse come from professionals who work with youth, like mental health, medical educational, police and human service workers, all of whom have a legal duty to report suspected abuse ("mandated reporters.") Mandated reporters need training. They need to help with, e.g. knowing the limits of corporal punishment, what to do if the abuse happened long ago, how to spot human trafficking and how much proof they need to act.

Several in-depth online free training already exist. BCAC, for example, has a free course to train mandated reporters on how to identify, prevent and report child abuse in its Online Training Institute at its website. The site is updated to reflect changes in the law and we also serve as resources on mandatory reporting laws in all 50 states.
