Dear Chair Kaiser, Vice-Chair Washington, and Members of the Ways and Means Committee:

We are writing on behalf of the Maryland School Psychologists' Association (MSPA), a professional organization representing about 500 school psychologists across the state. We advocate for the social-emotional, behavioral, and academic well-being of students and families across Maryland.

The purpose of this letter is to provide our support for House Bill 208 – Public Schools – Provision of Menstrual Hygiene Products. This bill requires each public school to provide free menstrual hygiene products to students.

Statistics suggest that nearly one in five American girls have left school early or missed school entirely due to an inability to access menstrual products. Girls also miss instructional time in the classroom when they forget or are unable to bring these products from home and resort to asking the school staff or a friend. Menstrual products are often viewed as luxuries rather than necessities to participate fully in school, and as a result, this missed instructional time makes being successful in school, that much more difficult.
